The Head of the Body?

We don't really know how many general disciples (followers) Jesus had but we know that he appointed twelve men to be the principal leaders of the movement. Of these, Peter was in some sense a leader. One of them, Judas, betrayed the Christ – as Jesus knew that he would. In the middle of May the Church remembers Matthias who was chosen to replace Judas and restore the number of Apostles to twelve. It is interesting to note that though Jesus had himself appointed twelve, the Early Church did not think it necessary to "top up" the number repeatedly as Apostles were martyred or died natural deaths. The reason may be that the number of twelve Apostles was chosen to show to the Jewish people that Christ's Church was the new, restored Israel - the People of God. When the missionary project gradually moved outwards into a gentile (non-Jewish) world, this symbolism was perhaps no longer so important.

Deacons and Priests (always technically separate) took on the role of running the Church. Bishops are, in modern thinking, actually priests to whom is entrusted a greater responsibility – their role is now thought to have developed over time and not to have been in existence from the beginning as a separate order.

The Roman Catholic Church, the largest single denomination of Christians (over a billion worldwide) has been presided over for many centuries by the Bishop of Rome, the Pope (the name means "papa, father"). The Roman Church claims an unbroken chain of authority from St. Peter, the leader of the Apostles. The Protestant answer to the claim is that there were no "monarchical bishops" in the Early Church – the Bishop of Rome eventually gained wider authority because he was bishop of the Imperial City – the claim to authority from Peter is a later rationalisation and justification.

The Church of England and the Worldwide Anglican Communion look to the Archbishop of Canterbury as a figurehead – but he is far from being an "Anglican Pope".

Like the Protestant Churches, the Orthodox Churches reject Rome's claims – they are headed by their own Patriarchs. Many give allegiance to the Ecumenical Patriarch in Constantinople (otherwise known as Byzantium or Istanbul).

It's interesting to speculate that had the Church acted otherwise in the early centuries (and had the Church of Christ not fragmented) it might still be governed by a council of Twelve Apostles!

But would the Church still be here at all after twenty centuries if it had been run by a committee? Answers on a postcard

Hartington C of E Primary School-Hartington C of E Primary School- As usual time does not stand still, we are busy with many projects and the children, as always, rise to every occasion. SAT's week was supported by Governors which was much appreciated, the children have worked hard and can now focus on a range of exciting activities. On Friday of SAT's week we had a visit from "Bugs 'N' Bones", it was an excellent session with a variety of weird and wonderful creatures which the children were able to handle and ask questions about.

We continue with the monthly visits from MAST & Michael Tinker who provide inspiring and informative sessions on Bible stories for the children. The School Council, as always, is very proactive and chaired by the year 6 pupils with governors Mrs Bruce and Mrs Clayton in attendance. During this terms meeting the children democratically selected six Christian

values which best reflect the school and created a new more contemporary vision statement in today's more diverse community.

The continual development of the children's voice will involve representatives from the school council undertaking a Health and Safety Audit of the school with the previously mention governors. The next planned meeting is on the 14th June.

Gardening Club runs every Thursday after school, under the watchful eye of Mrs Wildgoose and Mrs Broomhead. We are nurturing the flowers for the village planters as well as growing a range of vegetables which we hope to use in the school lunches towards the end of term. A sunflower for every child has been sown in the club. New planters, which have been filled with annual border flowers and made by the children from the club under the careful supervision of Mr Webley one of the children's parent. An additional planter was presented to the school by Mr Webley to replace the damaged one at the entrance to the school.

Our termly Celebration Worships, which are led by the children will be held in Church and are on May 25th and July 13th. This year the annual Maypole Dancing will be part of the PTA "Hartington Great Bake Off" and fund raising activities in the Village Hall. A walking treasure hunt and much, much more- come along and enjoy. The Y3,4 & 5 children will be participating in a Mountain Bike session on 5th June as part of the School Sport Premium funding. The remainder of the school will be preparing menus in preparation for the "Healthy Eating Week" which is part of the Change for Life Programme.

On 7th June the whole school will visit Derby Cathedral with Elton Primary School, the theme being "Pilgrimage". Which is both a journey of the body, an outward journey and a journey of the spirit, an inward journey. This term has seen the whole school go swimming on a Wednesday afternoon, this has meant we have not been able to participate in as many Sports activities as BIGGHARTS at QEGS. However, we are looking forward to the Quad Kids and Rounders competitions as well as the 3 Dales Sports on 28 June. Finally, the whole school will be at Lea Green residential outdoor centre on 18/19 July. The whole school is working hard to deliver a singing and acting performance on Thursday 28th June at 11am where parents, governors and members of the community will be invited. Community Lunches go from strength to strength the final one for this academic year will be held in unison with the Celebration Worship on 13 July.

Hartington Village Hall Update Progress has been made on developing an application for a grant to refurbish our Village Hall. Installing a new boiler and heating system, together with ceiling insulation, is the key priority identified by our users. However, we will also include the development of a new kitchen, replacement of the electrical switch box, and a few other smaller priorities within our total bid. The final sum that we bid for is likely to be in the region of £70K. Our Management Group next meet on 12th June to finalise the application. We will know by the late Autumn if we have been successful. We will also develop a phased development should the single bid not be successful, and would hope to then complete the work over a three year period using some matched funding as well as a raft of bids.

Our support of the **Rural Social Group** continues with the next meeting to take place on Tuesday May 22nd at 2.00. The first of six **Craft Fairs** was successful and the next will take place on Saturday 26th May from 10.00.

We were delighted with the success of the **Cheese Factory/Hartington Through Time exhibition** and our thanks go to Alan Salt and members of the History Group. The event was free entry with donations which raised £133 which will be given to the Village Hall.

Finally, we were very grateful for the help of the **Cubs and Scouts** on the evening of 10th May when we tackled a woodworm issue. They moved a large amount of material that had been in store and in the kitchen and tackled the task with huge energy and good humour. They were a credit to their families and Scout Leaders.

Cheese making Exhibition 5.5.18-Hartington Village hall- This was an excellent day. I was talking all day from 10.00 am to 5.00pm. There were people in all day, and the great thing that as well as many of the ex-Dairy Crest Staff there was also a lot of passing visitors, which was nice. I collected lots of pictures from people and put a lot on Facebook asap, which generated a lot of interest and comments. People were asking me next day "when will the next one take place " this was from both ex staff who came and others who could not make the day. The day was a great success the only problem for me was I needed more hands, I found it impossible to talk, sample cheese and work the TV presentation on my own. Next time I'll get some help. Thank you to everyone who helped and attended- Alan Salt.

Hartington History Group- Hartington Through Time Our small but compact exhibition was held on Saturday 5 May in Hartington Village Hall, alongside the Cheese Factory exhibition. We had a wonderful attendance and were kept busy all day, serving refreshments and meeting people who had "tales" to tell us about their families and houses in which they lived. It was a delight to meet some "senior members" who had brought along photographs, which we were able to scan on the day, these will be so useful as we go forward. It was lovely to see so many old friends meeting again and sharing past memories, one example being- Mary Sherratt, now living in Lincolnshire and Nancy Coates of Ecton, who have been friends for a number of years, they so enjoyed meeting up again and catching up on all their news.

We reaped lots of information on various houses in the village, and met a few people who would like to get involved to research their own house in the village. I think we have lots of leads to follow which will keep us busy for a while. Plus the bonus of managing to raise £230.00 for the group to pay for storage folders etc. However, we would welcome anyone who would like to join us, we are very low on numbers! We meet every Monday 7pm to 8pm in the Bakehouse at the Village Hall. It is on a come along basis and if you are available we would appreciate help. Attendance is not needed each week, as a lot of the research can be done at home, and then brought back to the meeting as and when. Hartington History Group-Many older residents in the area will remember Dr Williams, who was one of the GPs based at Hartington from 1954 until 1986. He has recorded a variety of early memories from his time in the area, which the History Group has reproduced in pamphlet form for sale at £1, with the proceeds going to Hartington Community Group funds. July 2018, at 7.00 pm, in the Church, we hope the village residents will attend and tell us what they think we can do to avoid the closure of our village Church.


