My late father-in-law was an Ammunition Examiner in the army at the end of WWII. At one point he was stationed in Egypt and was involved in writing off and then destroying or dumping countless tons of now surplus explosive shells. Some very large shells were dismantled for some reason and the men on this dangerous work included some locals. They worked in huts on heavy wooden benches covered with cloths of leather to cut down the risk of a disastrous spark. The cloths hung down to the ground. My father-in-law noticed that one of the Egyptians used to sit under the table, as though in a tent, to eat his lunch. When the Arab was asked why, he explained in all seriousness that these days fell in the fast of Ramadan when Moslems were not meant to eat before dusk. If he sat under the table thus, "Nebi" (the Prophet Mohammed) looking down from heaven would be unable to see him cheating!

This amused Kate's father — he assumed that any believer in God would take it for granted that nothing can be hidden from the gaze of Heaven, so to speak. Religion teaches us that not even "the secrets of our hearts" can be hidden from God. We sometimes even hide truths

from our own selves, but nothing can be hidden from God who is omnipresent (everywhere) and omniscient (knowing all things). If considered and dwelt upon this is a disturbing concept – but no doubt it ought to be!

That said, the notion that we are always watched is not one I'd want to introduce to a small child.

The idea that naughty children won't get presents at Christmas has now been exploited by a product called The Elf on the Shelf. You buy one of these elf dolls and prop it up in the house before Christmas telling your children that it is watching at all times and will report their doings to "Santa". Creepy or what? Even worse you can buy mock surveillance cameras with flashing red lights to stick on the ceiling (they are, as I write, now being sold off cheaply in Bakewell). They are to convince your children that "Santa" really is spying on them. Don't be surprised if they grow up paranoid!

What on earth are we doing to our children?

A Village Life: Hartington 1933 – 55. On 10 December Hartington History Group published this book based on the diaries of John Robert Sherratt, who lived in the parish throughout his life from 1900 - 1977. Illustrated by many previously-unseen photographs of Hartington and its inhabitants, John's brief diary entries are put into context by a timeline of national and international events. There are separate fascinating features on other village personalities, buildings and institutions, creating a unique and valuable record of village life in the middle of the 20th century.

Cllr David Chapman, Deputy Chair of the Peak District National Park Authority and the local district councillor, launched the book at Hartington Village Hall on January 15th in an event attended by people from the village, the surrounding area, supporters and sponsors. "The 22-year period covered by the diaries of John Sherratt were some of the most momentous in the mid-20th century," said Cllr Chapman. "They covered the abdication of Edward VIII; the Second World War; the terrible winter of 1947; the opening of the Youth Hostel at Hartington and the closing of the Leek and Manifold Light Railway. There are still living connections with many of these events in the village, because there are people still around with these links and knowledge."

Richard Gregory, who compiled the book, thanked all those who had contributed, especially villagers adding: "This really is *your* book, the community's book, helping to retain the hold on our cultural heritage." *A Village Life: Hartington 1933-55* (ISBN No: 978-1-5272-2541-1) is priced at £7.99 and its publication was supported by the South West Peak Landscape Partnership/Heritage Lottery Fund and Hartington Charities. Hartington C of E Primary School- On Saturday 8th December the PTA organised a Christmas Market. Despite the awful weather people turned out to buy that last elusive Christmas present! The event was followed by a Lantern parade and the lighting of the Christmas trees.

On Thursday 13th December the school performed its traditional Nativity. This year the title was 'It's a Party'. This was followed by the Pea & Pie supper and grand raffle. The first prize of a luxury hamper donated by Mr & Mrs Wallis was won by John Wardle. Numerous other fantastic prizes were donated and won on the night. The PTA would like to thank everyone who donated and supported in any way. The combined money raised over the two events was £1615.02.

On the run up to Christmas pupils invited residents of their local community to participate in Chairobic activities delivered by Mrs P Grant at the school. Some of youngest pupils form the school took great care demonstrating actions to the residents trying to ensure that they didn't over exert themselves. This was followed by the traditional Christmas Community Lunch lovingly prepared by Mrs A Stubbs and Miss A Wardle. The PTA kindly donated a selection of prizes for the Christmas raffle, which

was to show their appreciation towards the community for supporting school events throughout the year. The children, staff and members of the community were excited to wear their Christmas jumpers in support of the worthwhile charity 'Save the Children'.

The final church display of the year 'Let there be Peace' is well worth a visit. The children have displayed work undertaken in class about World War 1 in its 100th year. They also decorated a Christmas tree for the 'Christmas Tree Festival'. Hartington Primary School hosted a RE workshop for local church schools on Thursday 29th November. The workshop was organised by the Diocese conjunction with 'Blue Academy' from Nottingham. Students in years 7-11, ran workshops for the primary pupils focussing on three world faiths - Christianity, Islam and Hinduism. The primary pupils were divided into groups and rotated around the workshops - each session lasting for about 45 minutes. During the sessions the pupils learned about Islamic prayer, the Five Pillars of Islam, Hindu festivals, Hindu Gods, Christian Communion and prayer. Pupils had the opportunity to ask questions and many of the primary pupils asked deep and challenging questions about faith which the students answered exceptionally well. Feedback from the Hartington pupils was very positive. They had not only enjoyed the workshops and working alongside pupils from other schools but they appreciated the opportunity to learn about faith from Islamic, Hindu and Christian students.

On Thursday 20th December as part of the schools on going safe guarding programme the children investigated through workshops, videos and discussion how to keep themselves safe and visible on the roads during the dark winter mornings and evenings. The school accessed resources from the Road Safety Team, which enhanced the children's understanding whilst raising their awareness of the dangers the dark evenings bring.

Friday 21st December, last day of term began with all the children attending breakfast club for a 'Big Breakfast'. This comprises of a full cooked breakfast kindly prepared by Mrs Stubbs and Miss Wardle. This was followed by the children rehearsing the Christmas Carols and narration of the Christmas Story ready for the performance at 10am when the school doors were opened to parents, Rev Benson and members of the community. An outstanding performance was acknowledged by all who attended, people commenting that they couldn't wait for next years' concert. Tea/Coffee, mince pies and biscuits

were then served to the congregation. Later that day the children enjoyed a Christmas party full of games and special food, with a special visit from Santa. School closed at 3:30 after a fun packed day. **Happy Christmas and Happy New Year to everyone.**

Hartington Village Hall Update

By the time you read this one year will have passed since seven Trustees and representatives from many of our user groups came together to take the Hall forward from a financial crisis that would have seen it go out of business by September 2018. In brief we have cut our costs wherever possible, increased the use made of the Hall, balanced the budget, established a website

(www.hartingtonvillagehall.co.uk), and have established a small fund to match grant applications that will be made over time to enable the roof to be replaced, 40+ year old boiler replaced, insulation added together with several other issues faced by the almost one hundred year old building. We are a charity with trustees acting to effectively manage the building constructed in 1924 on behalf of the community. Much has been achieved through a reliance on a number of willing volunteers.

We plan on holding a 'One Year On' afternoon on **Sunday 5th May** for families from our community to come together to hear about our achievements as well as plans to take the Hall forward. Please put the date in your diaries – there will be free refreshments and an opportunity to come together as a community in a building that is, as our primary school children stated in our new logo, 'At the **Heart of Our Community'**.
