Waterloo Inn, Biggin

It is known that the Waterloo Inn has served the good people of Biggin and surrounding villages since at least 1819 when Sarah Prince is listed as Landlady. It is very likely that the pub dates back to 1753 or earlier but there is confusion about this, and about what it was called. The Golden Cockerel is one possibility (although this was probably located further up Main Street), or the Holly Bush (probably not, as there is a Holly Bush Cottage on Main Street). What is certain is that the pub is very old, the oldest part is the cellar which is of natural stone and very cramped and the building is much changed from the original layout.

The Waterloo was long the meeting place of the local lodge of the Ancient Order of Shepherds a sort of benevolent society where subscriptions bought a basic level of support in hard times from around 1890 onwards. The Shepherds completed a Walk around the village during Biggin Wakes week. Later on, The Loyal & Ancient Order of the Buffalos used the Waterloo as their base too. After redecoration last year, we renamed the smaller of our two rooms "Shepherds & Buffs".

Whilst keen to mark the history of the pub, current Licensees Steve and Debs Thomas have undertaken much improvement work (with more to come) to ensure that The Waterloo continues at the centre of our community for many more years to come. We recently replaced the pub sign and were intrigued to find one from many years ago under the sign we replaced (pictured).

The Waterloo is now an increasingly busy and vibrant place. In addition to being popular with locals, walkers and cyclists, the on-site campsite brings visitors all year round. Our reputation for good beer, good food and




Figure 1: The Old "Old Sign"

Tales from a field

Making hay whilst the sun shines ...haymaking heralds Summer is finally here for me..and the longer grass is great for the bugs, bees, butterflies ...and my foraging trips.

I use herbs and foraged goodies everyday to keep my family & animals healthy and Biggin is bursting at the seams with edible plants. Here's just a few of my foraging favourites:

Chickweed is an overlooked but underrated weed with cleansing and healing properties and is packed full of vitamins and minerals. Its tender leaves can go in salads or Blend into homemade pesto to liven up fish or chicken.

Yarrow is common hedgerow plant, the young leaves are edible and have a sweet slightly bitter taste for salads or soups. Also known as woundwort, yarrow was used traditionally to stem bleeding from wounds. I use it on my chickens when they injury themselves.

Wild garlic, nettles, dandelion and yarrow leaves are all delicious when blanched and used as you would spinach, perfect for soups & curries.

I grow edible flowers In my own garden; roses, violas, pansies and French marigold petals all add a splash of colour when added to salads and growing your own herbs means you'll always have some to hand ...a few mint leaves with boiling water poured over is a deliciously simple tea, great for delicate tums and Lavender adds a beautifully delicate flavour to cakes.

My favourite blend of all time for poultry is Dried rosemary, rose and mint added to the nesting box bedding to deter flies and mites. I also use apple cider vinegar as a disinfectant in the coop...so it smells somewhere between a chip shop and a florist in there on cleaning day!

Using edible plants medicinally isn't new, it has been around since prehistoric times and this new interest in foraging has simply renewed our interest in the health benefits of commonly found hedgerow plants...so why not take a look at whats growing outside your own front door, you may be surprised at just what you can find.

Foraging rules: always know what you're eating BEFORE you eat it

Hartington Village Hall Roof Appeal Update:

On the 5th July Trustees of the Village Hall learned that the first two of their grant applications have been successful. The Trustees of The Duke of Devonshire's Charitable Trust has awarded the roof appeal the full £5K applied for, while Alstonefield Leaden Boot Challenge has awarded £200 towards the £28,300 needed to re-roof the village hall. Trustees are extremely grateful to both organisations for their support.

Hartington Village Hall Update:

Recent weeks have seen considerable activity at our Hall. Apart from maintaining our regular weekly dances, Pilates, badminton, HYPAC, Scouts, flower arranging, History, archery and monthly Rural Social Group meetings trustees and members of the Management Group have been busy raising money to replace the main roof. The current roof covering is a lightweight asbestos tile and is well over 60 years old. The tiles are decaying and the heavy rain in mid-June caused slippage of tiles that meant a serious leak which damaged one wall display of our historical images of village life. We have been fund raising since the summer of 2018 but launched a lottery in May. As at 1st July we have sold 95 tickets raising £4650. The first of 12 monthly draws will take place at the Post Office at 6.00pm on Wednesday 10th July. Cllr David Chapman will make the first draw with one lucky winner receiving a cheque for £100. Eleven more draws will be made on the second Wednesday of each month through to June 2020.

The Charles Cotton also hosted a Pie Supper and Auction of Promises on Sunday 23rd June in aid of the roof appeal. Trustees would like to thank all individuals and businesses who donated 'Promises' as well as the 50+ who attended a most enjoyable evening. A marvellous total of £1780 was added to our roof appeal through the generosity of those who responded so positively to the skilled auctioneering by Mick Partridge.

As a result of the fund raising we now have £10,000 that we can use to match fund a range of grants that have been applied for. The roof replacement will cost £28,300 and grant applications totalling £21,000 have been submitted. The outcome of the applications will be known by the end of July.

Trustees would also like to publicly thank the 18 volunteers who undertook a major Spring clean of the Hall over several days in late May/early June.

Hartington Village Hall Fund-raising 1943 – 1944

In the context of the current sterling efforts to raise much needed funds to refurbish the Village Hall, it is interesting to look back 75 years to the time when the community was busily engaged in fund-raising to purchase what was then known as the Amusement Hall, owned by Mr Victor Perry. This was done against a background of wartime austerity and terrific parallel efforts by the community to raise funds in response to the 1943 Wings for Victory Week.

From the information provided by John Sherratt in his diary, [see 'A Village Life, Hartington, 1933-55', pp.37 and 39] and in the absence until recently of any additional information, it had appeared that the community in general were raising funds towards the £1250-00 required to purchase the hall, including a popular fund-raising technique of the era, a Mile of Pennies. Mr Tom Gibbs recalls that this was true, but his memory [he was a small boy at the time] is that general fund-raising raised only a limited amount.

Tom informed me that in fact the Ellis family made a 'substantial' donation towards the Amusement Hall purchase. There remained a shortfall when the purchase was due to be completed, so the Ellis' additionally loaned the money, interest-free, to cover it. Bert Ellis, the Keith Quine of his day, was the leading figure in the fund-raising task and his brother Walter, who Tom thinks supplied the finance, was one of the Village Hall's first trustees.

This explains the entries in John Sherratt's diary for early 1946 [25 January, April 8, May 24, p.56 of 'A Village Life'], the purpose of which now seems more obvious – to have a good time at the same time as raising substantial sums to help pay off the loan.

We know that after World War Two a village dance band was formed – Birches Band – made up of Margaret Riley, Harold Birch, Walter Birch, Dorothy Birch, Fred Birch and Lou Riley, amongst others, playing a variety of instruments, some said to have been home-made, which included piano, violin,

Hawaiian guitar, cello, xylophone, banjo and drums. The primary aim was to raise funds for the Village Hall, and soon attracted dancers from the surrounding villages and Buxton, plus locally stationed RAF personnel, regularly playing to packed houses on Saturday nights. Again, I think it can be concluded that those funds will have gone towards paying off the balance of the Ellis' loan.

The Ellis brothers and families arrived in Hartington from the Derby area in the late 1920s. By the late 1950s they were either deceased or had all moved on. It is worth re-iterating, I think, the wonderful contribution the Ellis' made towards the life of the village during those 30 years, both as substantial employers as well as significant supporters of the Village Hall, St. Giles Church, and the wider community.

In June, hours after attending my end of first-year ball at the University of Bristol, I embarked upon a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity - travelling to Colombia for a three week academic programme at the Universidad de Los Andes in Bogotá, in partnership with Red Tree Study. When I was selected for the course and scholarship in April I was thrilled, not only due to the competitive nature of application, but because of how the course perfectly combined my passions for politics and travel. The course - "Armed Conflict, Peace Processes and the challenges of Peacebuilding in Colombia", explored the recent history of the Colombian conflict and the current obstacles to peacebuilding during a key transitional period during which Colombia navigates to build a lasting peace following the signing of a peace deal in 2016. In addition to lectures from world-renowned academics on topics as broad as drug policy, the impact on children to the international dimension of the peace process, the program

included field visits to governmental and cultural agents. These field visits included the Special Jurisdiction for Peace Office (which is the judicial mechanism for justice in the Colombian case), the United Nations, and the Center for Memory, Peace and Reconciliation.

An undoubtable highlight was a session from Humberto de la Calle, who was the chief negotiator in the peace process with the FARC, a major guerrilla group. The course emphasised our engagement and curiosity, and we were able to have emotional conversations with former FARC members and the RedePaz team, with these experiences being incredibly thought-provoking for all participants.

I also experienced a wide range of cultural activities, from learning to play Tejo and watching Colombia play football in the Copa América tournament, to visiting the famous Museo Botero and sightseeing at Monserrate, which all offered an insight into Colombian culture. We also found time for plenty of social experiences too, from salsa dancing at Andres Chia to exploring Bogotá's nightlife.

Additionally, we managed to travel beyond Bogotá, including hiking to incredible waterfalls at Choachi and visiting a spectacular underground Salt Cathedral at Zipaquirá. Thus, the course provided a unique opportunity to personally engage with major governmental organisations and leading academics, as well as the chance to explore Colombia's vibrant and colourful culture alongside like-minded students from across the world, ultimately creating an unforgettable experience.



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
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
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
