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## **High Peak Harriers**

'**The High Peak Harriers'** was initially called 'High Peak House'. First indicated on an Ordnance Survey map of the area in 1841, it became well supported by nobility and gentlemen of the time and their association with the 'hunting' fraternity of around 1881. Becoming known as '**The High Peak'** it had a relatively short life for a public house even though **'The High Peak Hunt'** met there at least once per week and on occasion twice weekly either on Wednesday or Saturday. '**Boxing Day'** meet and '**New Year's Day'** meet being the highlight of the season.

Locals can remember the riders, horses and hounds gathering half an hour before departure. It was at this time that the '**stirrup-cup**' (or 'parting-cup') was given to guests as they were leaving and had their feet in the stirrups (the term described the 'cup' that the drink was served in). Port, Sherry or Mulled-wine was the traditional drink served often accompanied by a light snack.


Hunting country lies between Bakewell, Buxton and Ashbourne in the Peak District. It is predominantly 'stone-wall and grass country' with old turf generally more than 1000 feet above sea level.

The High Peak Hunt was established in 1848 by Mr. Thornhill of Stanton-in-the-Peak. The pack was been bred entirely on 'studbook harriers' and feature predominantly at 'The Great Yorkshire

Show', Honiton. 'Hills Cromford Brewery Company Limited' was listed as being the brewery supplying the inn. It was founded in c1825 at the "Greyhound" (or Black Greyhound"), Market Place, Cromford. Developed by the Higgott family it was an extension of their 'maltings' operations and Matthew Hill delivered, via Shire Horse and dray, to outlying taverns within the area including 'Duke of York', Elton; 'Jug & Glass' along with nine other local Inns; all of whom were also associated with the hunting fraternity. Activities were recorded until 1886 when the brewery was acquired by **Offillers' Brewery Limited** in 1914 and was closed in 1966. Almost directly in front of the **High Peak Harriers** was nestled **Woodbine Cottage.** It was the home of many and in the early 1950's Mr. Isaac Sherratt and his wife were in residence.

The 1<sup>st</sup> Carnival in Biggin was on 31<sup>st</sup> August, 1935 and it was here that the 'Float' was decorated prior to the procession throughout the village. Over the years Isaac and his wife made many thousands of paper roses on the run-up to the event and all vehicles involved throughout the day would be decorated here at **The High Peak**.

For many years of its life **the High Peak Harriers** had an 'Offiller's Nut Brown Ales' (painted) sign emblazoned along the upper frontage of the property. But during alterations being made during the late 1950's to living/office accommodation by the new owner, Derrick Barlow, part of the sign became obliterated by a window. It became a topic of conversation for the duration of its life before being removed totally during more recent lengthy renovations.



In the late 1800's and early 1900's 'The Marques of Hartington', the then Duke of Devonshire, was a frequent visitor to the village of Biggin. He would often call in the 'High Peak Harriers' either as part of a hunting party

or as a member of a particular parliamentary representative. On one occasion in 1944, he was pictured taking ale and cheese with his campaign manager (Mr. P. Bosely) having a discussion with the then landlord (Mr W Webster). Lord Hartington became a Member of Parliament in his early 20's and rose to be Financial Secretary to the Treasury until Balfour lost election in 1905. He was succeeded by the 9<sup>th</sup> Duke of Devonshire in 1908.

Little is known of licensees of **The High Peak**, but William and Hannah Webster were there in the 1940's. They were the Grandparents of Derrick Barlow who eventually became owner of the site. Having lost his wife Hannah, William remained until his death on 7.1.51 aged 72. The last landlord, Reg Currington took over. Reg was not in residence long, in the summer of 1954 he took over the tenancy 'The Waterloo Inn'. Thereafter **'The High Peak'** closed its doors to trade before becoming a haulage depot of the firm **Barlow & Hodkinson**.

**Hartington Surgery update-** Whilst Covid-19 restrictions, and precautionary measures, continue in accordance with Government Guidance, the Practice is now planning for the delivery of the seasonal flu vaccinations. The national annual seasonal flu campaign has been expanded this year to ensure more people are vaccinated against flu (influenza). This aims to ensure that more people are protected from the flu virus and to protect the NHS during the current pandemic. In addition to people aged 65 and over and those with certain chronic illness, this year, household contacts of those on the NHS shielded list, children of school year 7 age,

some health and social care workers and people aged 50 to 64 years will also be eligible for a free flu vaccination. Those at the highest risk of complications, if they contracted seasonal flu, will be included in the first cohort for vaccination followed by those aged 50 - 64, later in the year.

The practice HIGHLY recommends that if you are invited for a flu vaccination that you make an appointment to attend to protect both yourself and those around you. If you are not eligible for a free NHS flu vaccination you may be able to arrange a private vaccination, from an external retailer, at a cost. Hartington Surgery is proud to report that it exceeded all National and Regional targets for flu vaccination uptake during the period 2019/20 and demonstrated the highest, all round, performance within the locality. **Hartington Village Hall to re-open:** by the start of September we will be able to re-open. We have carried out a thorough risk assessment using guidance provided by Rural Action Derbyshire and have taken steps to ensure the safety and well being of members of our community. The steps we have taken and implications for hirers can be seen at <u>https://hartingtonvillagehall.co.uk/covid-19/</u> At the time of writing we expect activities such as Pilates, Badminton, History Group, flower arranging, Parish Council meetings and some activities relating to our Rural Social Group to start again in September.

Bookings can be made as usual on <u>https://</u><u>hartingtonvillagehall.co.uk/booking-form/</u> or by contacting Leon or Liz. Hopefully, we can see the gradual return of HYPAC, Scouts, a new Cubs group, the Wednesday Dance Club, our Singing Group and monthly Antique Fairs over the Autumn. Social distancing will need to be adhered to and we will be limiting use of the Upper Bakehouse for a time because of its size. Access to the kitchen will be

limited to a small number of our volunteers but given the size of the Hall we expect Hall users to face few concerns. Face masks can, of course, be worn but are not mandatory. Encouragingly we are currently discussing four wedding receptions being held in the Hall during 2021. All our volunteers connected with the Hall are so looking forward to welcoming you back.

Hartington Village Hall Roof Update: weather permitting we are on course to complete the re-roof of the Main Hall by late August. We had a set back when the asbestos tiles were stripped to reveal that the ceiling boards and some purlins had been badly affected by water leakage and woodworm. We took the decision to commit our 'Business Interruption' grant of £10K towards the extra work needed as the total cost will be in the region of £43,000. The new ceiling is tongue and groove redwood and certainly radically improves the internal appearance. With the roof being insulated we will benefit from reduced heating bills while ensuring a warmer, more welcoming environment.

We are grateful for the financial support from SW Peak Partnership, The Duke of Devonshire's Foundation, The Bingham Trust and the Alstonfield Leaden Boot Challenge as well as the £13,000 raised through community initiatives such as our 2019/20 lottery. We look forward to welcoming members of the community back to our Hall at the start of September.

Hartington Village Hall Lottery 2020/21 Update: we remain committed to replacing the ancient heating system for the Hall despite the additional costs of the new roof. As a result of a grant for £1000 from Hartington Community Group together with £2500 from Rob Tenty's 'Boiler Bash' we have the start of a match fund to hunt for potential grants. In September we will make the first of 12 monthly draws from our 2020/21 lottery, all profits of which will be devoted to a new heating system. £1800 will be available in prizes, £100 per month with December's being £500 and August being £300.

The likely cost of the heating system, including removal of asbestos panels and flue, will be £24,000 so please consider joining our community lottery if you have not already done so. Details and an application form are on <u>https://hartingtonvillagehall.</u> <u>co.uk/lottery/</u>,or get a form from the Post Office or ask one of the Management Group for a copy. Our Hall, owned by the community and managed by representatives of our village, is benefitting from an investment of £43K in a new insulated roof, has seen a new LED lighting system installed, and has been extensively redecorated by volunteers in the past 2 years. For it to move forward further we need the support of our entire community – take part in one of the diverse activities and clubs that will be held in 2020/21 and do consider supporting the lottery.

**Lesley Veit-** The tremendous contribution which Lesley made to Hartington Village hall has been acknowledged by a plaque alongside the one for Jenny Scurfield on the hall near the rose tree. Hartington Community Group was delighted to support this.

**Wells Dressing.** The dressing of the Well begins Monday 7<sup>th</sup> September in the Village Hall from 10.30. This usually takes us though to Friday so if you have any spare time and would like to be creative it would be great to see you. We will have to adhere to the Covid rules so we may have to have a rota system but don't let that put you off there is so much to do. Lucy Annat .

I liked timing myself to see if I was getting any faster and I did get faster. My first mile was just over 21minutes, my last mile was just over 10minutes!



I had three main routes which I ran; down the gated road, up and around the cheese factory and out past the school and the farm shop. I also ran on the local trails and on a few different routes if I was out for the day. On my final run I had no idea that there would be so many people clapping me along the route, it was amazing. I was really shocked when I ran into the village and saw everyone and even more

shocked when I was presented with a certificate from the village.

I was super happy with the money raised because I know that it is going to such a good cause. I would like to say a huge thank you to all the people that have sponsored me and all the messages and comments on social media which had a great impact on my days of running. A date for this event has still to be decided but this needs to be decided very shortly, in order to get the date into a website that publishes Garden Events nationally. ### Parish Council News-

**LITTER** The extra volume continues to be appalling but Derbyshire Dales District Council will take NO action due to budget constraints. That means NO MORE BINS and ONE collection on a Thursday. The Village Hall have very kindly agreed we can use the village hall bin over the summer period (when their activity is low) and the Parish Council will meet the costs of the extra collections. A team of litter pickers and additional plastic bags are being used to alleviate the problem. If businesses can get people to put take-away rubbish in their own commercial bins – so much the better.

**THE POND** We intend to deal with the level of silt. The biggest problem is the fish which need to be removed before we can drain the silt and replenish the water. We are seeking advice on how to catch them and to put them somewhere else. They are not natural to our pond. We will hope to commence once silage and haymaking are over. PS we are grateful for the barley straw bags supplied by a resident which see to keep the water free from green Algae.

**THE STANNER** We have weeded the area and will use a digger to remove the silt and growth at the base. We have notified County Council that the tarmac around the Stanner is in a poor state, dangerous and needs repairing.

**PARKING** This is a historical problem. We have no control over parking and it is Derbyshire County Council's responsibility for enforcing parking restrictions but there seems little deterrent to parking on the yellow lines. Any double parking in the centre are police responsibility if it is causing an obstruction. We have informed our local police liaison officer who informs us individuals must dial 101 to report specific problems. We currently have an application underway with County Council Highways to put double yellow lines at the end of the pond, on the brow of Hall Bank and on the bend opposite the Charles Cotton.

**PIZZA TRAILER OUTSIDE DEVONSHIRE** We have notified both DDDC street licencing authority and Peak Park about complaints that is an eyesore outside a listed building and on a public highway.

**BURIAL GROUND** We have created a new garden of remembrance with over 60 spaces, weeded the

existing areas, levelled the whole burial ground and installed new wider pathways.

**FACTORY SITE** We are all suffering from the noise particularly from the machines. All the relevant authorities have been notified and a site meeting has taken place which will hopefully lead to a reduction in noise. The first house is now sold and the site for

We are working on some alternatives which we will let you know about as soon as we've got everything planned - keep an eye on the notice boards around the village and the St Thomas's Facebook page for further updates.

It is unlikely that the Harvest Festival Service will follow its usual format. Realistically we expect that the annual Remembrance Sunday service will take a shorter form and be based entirely around the war memorial. We will be working with the Parish Council to decide how to best keep everyone who attends safe. We would like to think that by December everything would be back to normal but unless there is a sudden development with a vaccine we think that the candle lit carol service and nativity which we all enjoyed will have to take a different format to last year. We hope and pray that 2021 will see the church year provide opportunities for the village to rejoice together.

**Village Hall** - The Hall has been used twice for meetings since March. These were held under the strict distancing and sanitizing conditions as required in the current crisis. Other than that, the hall has been 'dark'. We can open up for meeting of up to about 20 people but not for general lettings due to restricted circulation areas. There will be another Parish Council meeting in the main hall in September. Hopefully the restriction on live performances will be lifted soon and we should be able to something on for the very large house (Plot 1) which is in different ownership is now of the market for £500,000. Any purchaser will have to return a large part of this plot to green field. A series of changes to the buildings and layout have been approved by the Peak Park Planning Committee despite our objections. The site is however still restricted to 26 homes in total.

Hartington Nether Quarter Parish Council If you have recently passed Heathcote Mere, you may have noticed a large piece of limestone which has been kindly donated by Longcliffe Quarries. The stone has been re-positioned recently to enable it to be used as the mount for a large colourful plaque, illustrated by local resident, Jennie Gill, which depicts some of the Mere's history and information about the wildlife surrounding it. Hartington Nether Quarter Parish Council hopes to arrange completion of this project, sometime this year, subject to the restraints of Covid-19. This beauty spot is popular with visitors, and locals alike, providing a tranquil seating area to take in the sights, sounds and smells of this traditional watering hole set in our scenic Peak District. The Parish Council encourages wildlife and is responsible for maintaining, and mowing, the area and strongly discourages parking vehicles upon the grass area and littering.

Hopefully we will be able to meet in September if we can set the social distancing rules and follow government guidelines for groups. The Prize was a holiday in Germany, this was to be a new and slightly scary experience for Mary as her life had been spent looking after her brothers and sisters at the working Blacksmiths Smithy. After some considerable thought and concern about travelling abroad, two good neighbours, Mrs Riley and her daughter Betty. agreed to book a holiday and travel with her.
