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Dauphin Antiques, previously Post Office, General Stores, Café and housing of lodgers

We begin our story with a mystery; over the doorway on the stonework is painted a sign –

E. A. PERCIVAL Grocer and Tobacconist-

The sign would have been created in or around 1890 with the shop belonging to Ann Elizabeth Percival. From the 1891 census, Elizabeth Percival is listed however Ann Elizabeth Percival is listed in the trade advert details for that year as a shopkeeper



The first photograph we have depicts the building with a fuel pump, phone box and a sign over the door – CAFÉ. Adverts on the wall for TUROG - (Turog flour was sold to local bakeries, who baked brown bread with it and then sold and

advertised the **Turog** brand. Up until the 1960's **Turog** competed with Hovis as the leading "Healthy Loaf". This large wooden sign would have hung outside a small local Bakery, around the 1940's and 1950's.) Phone boxes nationwide started in the 1920's. Any ideas on the dates of the 2 vehicles shown in the photograph? -the one on the left maybe an early 1930's Ford AA.

During the war years and through to the mid 60's, Mr Arthur Tress with his wife, Anna, and their 2 children, Peter and Pauline, lived here as a shop, Post Office and Café, they also took in lodgers. It is thought that Mrs Williams, Anna's mother, may have lived here prior to this. Miss May Bunting began her long career in Hartington's postal service here alongside the Tress family. The post office was a small cubicle in the central part of the room with the café area to the right. The tables were covered with check design heavy duty plastic tablecloths.



The postal service during and after WW2 was very much "in house". The post bags were collected from Hartington Station having arrived by train from Buxton, by Mr Tom Kavanagh, having walked there and back with his little dog. On his return the post was sorted by his brother Bob and Daisy Broomhead from Arbour Head. Daisy would deliver on foot to the village, Bob to Biggin and Tom would have the mammoth task of walking, via Newhaven, and Friden to Alsop Moor and back. Deliveries were done everyday except Christmas Day.

During the late 50's and into the 60's, we can see some changes- the Telephone Box has gone, to the left of the door is a small "window hatch" from which Ice Cream was served. To the left of the building

is Grove Cottage; Mr Brindley with his wife Bet lived here- the extension at the front was let to National Bank Ltd. once a week. A solicitor, Mr Hill, from Ashbourne would also attend on Fridays, having his lunch in the tap room of the Devonshire Arms. You can see a milk churn close to the gate which led to the yard and shippen where five Jersey cows and one Guernsey were milked by Walter Holloway.

Around 1964/5 the post office, with May Bunting, moved to her home – “Ivy Dene” at the bottom of Hyde Lane. Mr and Mrs Mcleans took over the business and named it Café and Grill. Mr Alistair Sears with his family wife Maureen and two sons moved in on September 15th 1971. Bessie Blackburn from Bank House would work here along with Mrs Lansbury. Successful businesses flourished through into the 80’s and 90’s with various owners Ester and Roy Dyson who rented the café and grill room from Alistair living upstairs, and later Mr Stuart Grievson

During this time, an age-old problem would occur when there had been heavy rain. The photograph shows flooding which was a regular occurrence until the council created a culvert to take the flood water from the River Harding in the “The Dale”. You will notice also that the Name of the Bank has now changed to National Westminster Bank and there is no post box outside the café.



We now know the building as Dauphin Antiques, the owners Alan & Jan Robinson. The new venture started over 17 years ago, it was such an exciting but apprehensive time, scurrying around to find antiques and collectables. At that time, we were selling Victorian and Edwardian items. Our son, daughter and both mums helped out on different days, so we decided to purchase a more comfortable chair in the form of a leather chesterfield high back armchair for them to sit in. On the back of this we sold numerous chairs as they looked so comfortable in them. In fact, the elderly ladies of the village used to come and utilise them and sit and chat. Sylvia Pass, Nellie Deaville and Mariah (Ria) Deaville, to name but three.

During the past few years’ we have made major changes to the shop incorporating a flag floor, which compliments the period oak furniture we now sell.

It has been a lovely experience coming to Hartington, which we would not change for the world.

Vicar Letter

Hartington Surgery update - Happy New Year Everyone. It is hoped that 2021 will be able to offer some positivity. The National vaccination programme should be well underway in vaccinating the population against Covid 19 and working towards restoring some normality to our lives.

In recent times, national TV and radio bulletins have made important announcements regarding healthcare, flu vaccination eligibility and Covid vaccinations, before they have informed General Practice. These lines of communication have resulted in Practices being given information, and directions, with very little time to implement. Please be assured that the Practice will always aim to respond in the quickest way possible as soon as important information is released.

The Practice uses a variety of communication methods to keep our patients up-to-date with the latest Surgery news. The Practice website www.hartingtonsurgery.co.uk is the first point of call for information or online communication via E-Consult, followed by the ‘Hartington Surgery Patient Participation Group’ Facebook page, which, in conjunction with our Patient Group, features the latest Practice posts. The Practice widely communicates via text now, to confirm appointment bookings, invitations for vaccination and general updates. Accu RX is also used to generate a secure text message which is linked directly to your medical record and can be useful in informing you of test results and messages direct from the Clinician. If the Surgery does not have your up to date mobile telephone number, please contact Reception to add this to your medical record. “2020: It was the best of times, it was the worst of times”

Looking back, can we take good news stories forward? What can we learn from 2020? What will make a difference in 2021?

We have asked these questions to young, not so young and older people from our three villages and all walks of life. Here are some of the things they say.....

Primary School Children and Young people- “appreciation of family and friends; glad to get back to school; enjoyed getting out in the countryside”. “we have learnt to protect ourselves more than we used to and we do more things on our own” “learning from home was really hard because mum and dad had to work so we have to do a lot ourselves and with mum and dad helping”



“it is like the world stopped spinning, like it needed a rest. Maybe we all did and now we’ll all think more and do better”

We asked the children for some of their thoughts about the events of this year and how they felt about being away from school during the lockdown. The general consensus was that the children enjoyed spending some time at home playing outside, doing craft activities, having time with siblings and parents and the novelty of home-schooling, but they all agreed that they missed seeing their friends and the daily routines of school life. They were certainly very happy when they eventually did return to school!

Parents and Residents “Look out for your neighbour.” “We can help others to make new ways of communication, like face time and Zoom” “There have been brighter skies, the air is more fresh.” “There has been more time to play games with our children.” “I have enjoyed walking around and seeing all the well-tended gardens and have grown vegetables again” “I have enjoyed being home more and I have appreciated the changing of the seasons”

Key workers “What a funny year this has been. First lockdown - no school, no shops, no anything! Good thing we had our wonderful village shops and Post Office, but as a school kitchen, we were open all the time. Although this was different, I was happy to pitch in with the rest of the team. However as children gradually returned to school, in year bubbles, things appeared a little more like the norm!”

We still couldn't meet people in the community and the year 6 pupils were not able to have the usual trips out, they did manage to have a film and quiz night, along with a take away supper in school, with staff. Everyone had

a great time despite the lockdown, it gave these pupils the opportunity to show their talents by delivering a series of short sketches on what was happening in the country and around the world. It raised the spirits of the entire school. Watch out Britain's Got Talent, Hartington here we come!

McMillan was totally different, with an afternoon tea sent out to the community, still raising a wonderful amount.



I was so pleased at how the school and children were creative in their thinking of how to get round the current restrictions.

Now as we are in the run up to Christmas it's going to be really strange, no Pie & Pea supper, no Community Christmas lunch's (No stress Ha Ha!) but the children at both schools will still enjoy the usual Christmas lunch and party. Let's hope 2021 will be a better year for all."

Farmer - "Selling sheep was difficult and unusual. We just had to drop them off at the market and we'd receive an email telling us how much they sold for. But on a positive note, prices have gone up and having the family more at home helped massively with lambing this year"

New resident - "Moving at the start of lockdown and furloughed meant we had time to explore the area and we said a lot more hellos than we ever did in the city"

Senior member of the Community- "I don't drive, not on the internet and regarded as vulnerable; so what would I have done without the village shops, Post Office and Fiveways. The friendship of the village people and the care of the Surgery. They have all been a lifeline and are much appreciated"

"We have learnt the art of patience again and the need to keep to rules and regulations"

"I am fortunate to live in Biggin where I can enjoy the green spaces and we have so many sensible people who just get on with what needs doing"

Parish Councillor "What a strange year we have all had! The Parish Council has still been dealing with Planning, Highways, Street Lighting, and problems from parishioners sent via email. Improvements to the war memorial were completed before Remembrance Day as well as repairs to the steps on the pump. Thank you, Trevor Wragg who undertook this work. With best wishes for 2021"



What can make a difference- "The vaccine; community gatherings; a proper doctors' appointment; being able to see your animals sold at market again; looking forward to shopping without wearing a mask"

Community Support for 70+ and vulnerable- Hartington YHA suddenly found itself closed with a great deal of fresh food which would be wasted - a phone call and within a day a team of volunteers had

distributed the "goodies" to many members of the community aged over 70years. From this opportunity, during the lockdown and beyond, these volunteers continued with weekly shops, phone call and friendly support. A Book/Magazine swap was also developed in the Village Hall, with volunteers distributing within the community

"I was very fortunate to see a video on Facebook, of some of our village Mums and their children singing happy birthday to one of our senior ladies"

People have been kind, offering to do shopping, offers of takeaway meals, sharing books, lawn mowing, but most importantly, just taking the time to make conversations, by phone, in person, on Facebook or Zoom.

Biggin's older generation are a tough old bunch but additional help, physically, mentally or spiritually, was only a phone call away, with phone numbers posted to every resident on a temporary newsletter. The Village Committee checked on their Supper Club members, the WI checked on their group, the Church Warden and Committee checked on their congregation and neighbours checked in with each other.

VE Day "The War Memorial still held a two minute silence which was supported from peoples' homes; bunting and flags were hung from houses and businesses. A call to afternoon tea (socially distanced) based on each of the streets with scones and jam, and Phillip's decorated engine doing a tour of the village."





This was a thoroughly jolly affair with the theme of stay in your own garden party. Bunting, WW2 music, many in fancy dress enjoyed “over the wall” chats with neighbours and Biggin Hall generously gave every resident a cupcake to enjoy with their garden picnics.

Use of websites and Social Media – The positive use of digital resources reached out to many people young and old – the Virtual Open Gardens with a 100 days and over 60 gardens, those without the internet were included with volunteers taking photographs. The wells dressing was live streamed as well as the Christmas

Tree “Light up”. The Advent Windows were featured every day.

Our community Facebook page has grown from strength to strength and is now a much used and greatly valued source of information, notices, competitions and a source of support for many.

Jay Jay has even done his best to tempt us to a Zoom Bingo. This wonderful technology will never replace physical human contact and the natural interaction that happens. We can't wait to welcome you all back to the next Bingo.

Primary School and Children- Already well established intergenerational projects were in danger of being curtailed; but creative children, with a little help, soon rose to the occasion, ensuring their “buddy” received letters and pictures as well as information cards on daily exercises to stay fit and well – even a video demonstrating how to perform the exercises. Cake is always a winner with young and old (and those in between) so it was no problem getting the children to devise a MacMillan fund raiser with a difference as well as remembering a special lady no longer with us. One young lady ran 50 miles in 50 days to raise funds for a local hospice. This inspired the village community to acknowledge her achievements by a rousing clap at the finish line.

We are very fortunate to still have a church, chapel, and school in Earl Sterndale. The three together provide our village with a good number of community events, coffee mornings, summer and Christmas fairs, Flower festivals, Craft Groups, school services and more. We haven't been able to hold family church or chapel services all summer, but thankfully chapel did organize a harvest service and village displays of scarecrows. The school joined in, with this, with a fabulous display of scarecrows, which the children had greatly enjoyed making. Teachers and staff are working hard to provide a safe, enjoyable, learning, environment.

The village discussed how to safely celebrate Halloween and it was decided residents would place their goodies at the gate or front door and children could follow the lit pumpkin trail to find goodies and help themselves.

Sadly due to Covid restrictions we were unable to have the usual carols around the tree so a co-ordinated ‘switch on’ of the village hall Christmas tree lights and residents garden twinklers went ahead on Saturday 5th at 6pm spreading Christmas cheer throughout the village.

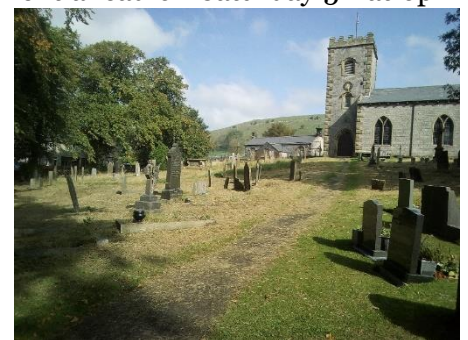
Church- Each of the village churches have used the year in different ways – cleaning, care of churchyard, finding ways of communicating through newsletters and online services.

A brief, but moving tribute was held with six wreath bearers, the reading of the names and the last post. Many stood in the distance or in their gardens



Community support for the village- Social Media has really come into it's own here. There are many examples of groups and individuals making a real difference: the stripping and re-painting of the seats around the pond; and, the cleaning of the Stanner, to name just a couple.

Biggin rallied round to ensure annual favourites like the pie and pea supper went ahead with a few covid-safe adjustments; instead of a sit down meal, it was a takeaway event. Biggin Hall gave all its fresh food away to residents, the Waterloo Inn offered takeaway food and drinks, and the church was open for private prayer.

Support for the wider Community – The national call for Clap for the NHS was supported enthusiastically. A call for duvets produced an amazing response from far and wide. Many sewing machines were dusted down and used to make masks.

Meals were cooked and delivered to a hospital, a local homeless unit and a family staying in temporary accommodation, with food donated by residents and Biggin Hall.

This year has seen so many “new people” getting involved with new and different activities, better use of modern technology-working hard to be inclusive and accessible to different generations.

These contributions from the members of our community are heart-warming and inspiring. The importance to all 3 villages of the Church, Chapel, School and a beating Community Heart is what has made 2020 something which future generations in our villages will reflect upon and perhaps say – “They didn’t do too bad a job”

Hartington Village Hall: With lockdown followed by Tier 3 restrictions we, in common with other Village Halls across Derbyshire, have not been able to offer our usual activities over recent weeks. However, this does not mean that we have been idle. Through the help of six volunteers we have transformed the foyer and Lower Bakehouse, the latter having become a glorified storage area over recent years. Damaged plaster has been removed and the area redecorated and transformed into a welcoming community space complete with our CD and book loan items on easily accessible shelves. We plan to house several volumes of images of Hartington going back over the decades and hopefully residents can return in 2021 to browse through the folders as well as benefit from the CD and book loans.

We have also benefitted by a report from 'De-Carbonise' who are supporting our plan to replace the ancient heating system. The options are few and essentially the report recognises that a new oil boiler plus other measures will reduce our oil consumption and carbon emissions by c20%. They are also offering a grant that will help with costs, though we remain significantly short of our target of £24K at this point. We were unsuccessful in a £10K grant application to The Prince's Countryside Trust.

We have also offered the Hall to Hartington Surgery as a potential vaccination centre when/if the Oxford vaccination becomes available.
