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## Earl Sterndale Village Green and Carnivals

In the days of William the Conqueror, the land was given to Henry de Ferrers, Earl of Derby who established the present village of Earl Sterndale. Since 1614, The Duke of Devonshire has been Lord of the Manor and owned the green. This was then purchased By Peak District National Park, to hold in trust for the village. They did attempt to sell it a few years ago. The parish council offered to purchase and bid for it, but the sale was withdrawn without explanation, so it remains with the Peak Park.

When speaking with members of the village community the most vibrant memories are those related to the “Carnival”. These were initiated by the village WI in 1961; some remarkable women created an event which involved every age group. The green would be decorated with bunting and large crowds would gather. The exact dates of many of the memories and photographs are not clear, but the video link here has provided some amazing pictures and a real sense of what the celebrations involved.

Central to the event – held at the end of June (being moved from September as that date clashed with so many other local events), was the Carnival Queen.



The first Queen was Julia Broady. She would be taken from one end of the village to the other on a float (decorated trailer drawn by a tractor), with her retinue. In the video you can see her being crowned by Mrs Frith from Chelmorton. The crown was papier-mâché sprayed gold and the cape an old curtain, the carnival queen, we think Wendy Jenkins, the next year had a smart tiara and a posh frock. The event raised a magnificent total £100

A marquee was erected on the “rec”, the field opposite the school. It was here that many stalls, tombola, flower arranging and cake and produce competition were held. In 1965 Mary Wheeldon remembers winning best cake- with her Victoria Sponge. There was also a dog show, a glamorous grandmother competition proudly won by Rebecca Melland in 1976- seen here with the carnival queen Sharon Goodwin.

There would be children’s races, including a challenging obstacle race - again see the video. Not to be out done men and women would also compete with enthusiasm. Fancy Dress competitions were not restricted to the children, a reference to the historic astronauts and moon landing of the late 60’s were represented sitting on the village green wall. There was a “Best dressed House”, Best Dressed

Pram, Best Dressed Bicycle, and much more. Judges would be identified from the local area and included the Mayoress of Buxton and wife of the local Vet -Shirley Hollands.

Refreshments – prepared by the ladies of the WI were available from the Church and on the green, a BBQ was held on the “rec”. Hollingsclough Band would provide the music during the day and Florie Wain with her band would perform a concert in the school – the most renowned being “Blue and White Dollies”. A dance in the evening with local groups such as “Twice Around” and the “Big Liyx” would perform on an articulated lorry with the curtain pulled back.

As the event grew in size a carnival committee took over the organisation from the WI. The funds raised by the event were used to

support Christmas parties for the village children with Father Christmas and presents. On one occasion there was a sponsored walk from Dowell Hall Farm.

In the 1990's the crowning of the queen was done by the Rev'd Derek Gibling. This photograph shows this happening in 1992.

The green is no longer the focus of village events, the tree at the top end with a seat around the trunk is where some of the many visiting walkers sit to eat their “butties”. There is also a stone memorial placed there in



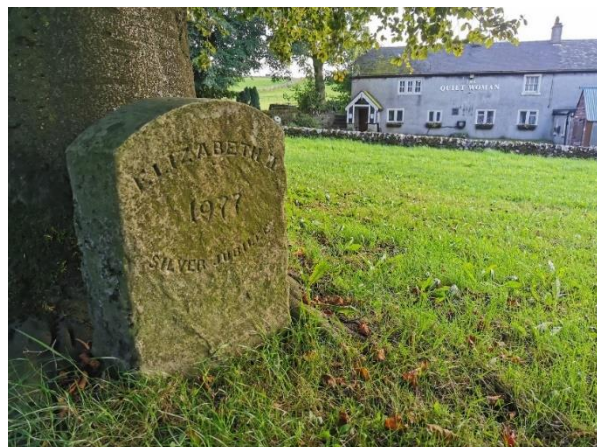
1977 for the Queens Jubilee. When the Parish Council met in September, the main item on the agenda was the trees on the green affected by ash die- back which will have to be felled. It is hoped replacements will be found to commemorate the Queen's platinum jubilee.

So many people have contributed to this article, a special mention of Mrs Mary Wheldon, Julia and Mark Broady, Jessie Etch and Linda Mycock. When talking with Pauline (Mary's daughter) we recalled many memories of the Village Youth Clubs, Biggin, Earl Sterndale, Hartington, Sheen which were the focus of young people lives in the 50's and 60's- we feel sure a front-page item would prove of interest- perhaps we can “resurrect” a table tennis challenge match?

Opening the “fayre,” Mrs. Morris said that in so doing she would like to express thanks to members of the committee responsible for its organisation and planning. “Such fairs as this are not staged without a great deal of hard work and very often by a few people,” she said. Pointing out that the event had been her first official booking prior to her becoming Mayoress. Mrs. Morris added: “I would like to compliment and thank all the people who have worked so hard to produce such a wonderful show of goods today. I am sure you all wish to get busy and make plenty of money towards your children's party and for the over 65's outing.”

**Important Notice from Hartington Surgery-** The last 18 months have been the most testing time in history for our NHS. In order to manage risk and ensure patient, and staff, safety it was necessary to explore different ways of working. The Surgery has been operating a system where patients were initially offered a telephone, or video, consultation. If it was necessary for them to be examined by a Clinician, they were then booked in for a 'face to face' appointment at the Surgery. Nursing appointments have continued 'face to face' at all times. The Surgery was able to greet pre-booked patients at the door and complete a brief covid screen before they entered. The Dispensary has, successfully, devised a new, safe, more streamline and efficient, prescription collection system from the external sliding window and covered hatch. All these important, precautionary, measures have ensured that the Surgery has remained fully operational throughout the pandemic. The time has come to look to the future and consider a more flexible appointment booking system and open front door. With effect from **Monday 4<sup>th</sup> October**, the front door will be open for pre-booked Surgery patients and enquiries. If you require an appointment, from this date, you will be asked if it can be managed over the phone within a telephone consultation. If this is the case, you can still have a telephone consultation and will not have to travel to the Surgery. If you do not think that your appointment can easily be managed over the telephone, then the Receptionist will be able to arrange a 'face to face' appointment at the Surgery. You will be asked some details regarding your visit in order that you can be booked with the most appropriate person and within the most suitable timescale. You will be asked to confirm that you do not have a new persistent cough, a loss of taste or smell or a fever/high temperature. If you do have any of these symptoms, or any other respiratory symptoms, which could potentially be Covid-19, you will, initially, be offered a telephone appointment and appropriate follow up will be re-arranged. If you do develop any of these symptoms before your 'face to face' appointment you must inform the Surgery and arrange a PCR Covid test online or by calling 119. When visiting the Surgery, please wear a face covering. Please do not arrive early for your appointment. If you do, please wait in your car, or outside, until your appointment time. Please do not bring anyone with you, unless you require a Carer, or Chaperone. Please sanitise your hands immediately upon arrival.

There will be limited seating inside the waiting room. If the waiting room is full, please wait outside until a seat becomes vacant. There will be a sanitising station with hand sanitiser and wipes to wipe down your chair if you wish. Please remember that you can also use the secure, electronic communication service 24/7, E-Consult, which can be accessed directly from the website [www.hartingtonsurgery.co.uk](http://www.hartingtonsurgery.co.uk).

Prescription collections, and Dispensary enquiries, will continue to operate from their new external window collection point and the internal Dispensary hatch will be closed. If you are booked in for a flu, or Covid vaccination, please continue to wait outside until you are called for your appointment to avoid, unnecessary, congestion in the waiting room. The Surgery would like to thank patients for their continued understanding and support during these difficult times and gives assurance that patient care is at the forefront of all planning and services.

**Hartington Village Hall Update:** On 12<sup>th</sup> October we held our AGM, the key points being:

**Finances** – we paid £44.8K for the new roof in September 2020. Grant income of £25.4K relating to this had fallen in the 2019/20 year, so our finances for 2020/21 look serious on first look. Hire income in 2020/21 was only £2340 (2019/20 £4489 and 2018/9 £8,315) vividly showing the financial impact of the pandemic. Expenditure was £51,660, with routine costs being £6880, down from £7994 in 2019/20. Fund raising in 2019/20 was £25,393, and amounted to £37,231 in 2020/21. At our year end on 31/08/2021 we held £30,870 in our accounts; the majority being designated for our replacement of the heating system in November. The external audit report for 2019/20 found no issues and we are grateful to our Treasurer, Kate Craven, for her work in this area. Overall, we estimate that the pandemic has cost us c£11,000 in lost income, the impact being more than addressed by successful receipt of business interruption grants.

The new heating system should be installed by mid-November. A big thank you to Kath Williamson, Carl Webster and Richard Sherratt for their help in moving our new oil storage tank. The next major priority will be refurbishment of the kitchen area, though we intend to also address a number of routine maintenance issues in 2022. We plan to consult our regular user groups as to what they would wish to see in a refurbished kitchen.

### Hartington Village Hall Lottery:

We have 108 subscriptions to our new 2021/2022 lottery with prize monies of £1800 available. The income from the lottery will act as seed monies to fund the kitchen refurbishment. Our September and October prizes were drawn on 13<sup>th</sup> October by Kieran

Bayliffe-Beirne, new landlord at 'The Devonshire Arms'. The winners were Alice Manifold (49), now residing in Matlock but brought up at 'The Devonshire Arms', and Lucy Abbott of Minton House, Hartington. Our next draws are on 10<sup>th</sup> November and the bumper prize of £500 will be drawn on 8<sup>th</sup> December.

**Hartington C of E Primary School-** The school hit the ground running, at the start of the autumn term, with the traditional task of dressing the School Well. This year the theme was 'From Small Seeds Grow ...' Thanks to Mrs Annat for the initial design, Mrs Parsons and Mrs Oliver for their support in completing the Well and to those member of the community who donated flowers. A total of £41 was raised for the school. Thank you to everyone who donated. After more than two years since the children attended swimming lessons we were pleased to be attending The Arc at Matlock for our weekly sessions. The children will have 10 hourly sessions, over two terms.

We are pleased to welcome an IT specialist onto the team who will be delivering dedicated IT sessions once a week alongside the schools teaching staff. We were very lucky to secure Mrs McNulty's expertise within this subject which is delivered via a rolling programme with PE. The children call her Mrs Mac and look forward to her visits. Years 1/2, 3/4 & 5/6 pupils undertook a cross country event with pupils from the local cluster at Parwich. This involved them running along a pre-determined track of 800 metres, ¾ mile and 1 mile. The children all enjoyed the experience, although some of the older children found the distance challenging! We are pleased to announce that the school now has its own orienteering course with an additional course located in the Youth Hostel grounds. This will provide many opportunities for cross curricular links to take place whilst the children remain active and challenged. Training was delivered by Jim Jenkinson from the local authority as part of the Orienteering package.

As yet again we were unable to open our doors to the Community for the Macmillan Coffee morning on Friday 24<sup>th</sup> September, the school organised a takeaway cake bake. This involved parents, governors and community members placing orders for cakes, which were kindly baked by Mrs Stubbs our catering officer. The event raised a total of £300 for the charity. MAST is back visiting the school and delivered a service 'The Parable of the Sower' this supported our teaching of the Harvest and the children's own worship. The children held their own service in school on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> October. This has been videoed and will be displayed on the school web site for parents to view. The traditional Harvest display was created in the children's corner of St Giles Church in readiness for the Harvest Service. The

village community, along with the children and parents have donated items for the Ashbourne Foodbank. These were handed over by some of the children on October 11<sup>th</sup> at St Elin Church. On Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> October the whole school will be visiting Lea Green for a day of fun and challenging activities, before breaking up for half term. Autumn term 2 will see the countdown to Christmas and all the subsequent activities the school usually takes part in.

**Parent and child Sessions.** On the 10<sup>th</sup> September a new group was launched for local children and their parents. The new Friday Playtime group is space for some unstructured play or craft for the children and a chance for a cuppa and a catch-up for the parents or carers. The group runs from 3.30pm, after the school closes for the weekend, until 5pm every Friday. The first three weeks have proved very popular, with families already attending Hartington Primary and prospective families both enjoying each session. **Wildflowers in Hartington-** As we move into the Autumn months, the volunteers involved in the Wildflower project met on the 4<sup>th</sup> of October at the Village Hall to review our progress this year, and to agree on our areas of focus going forward.

Objectives of this initiative which are to:

- Address the challenges of sustainability, care of the environment and natural world,
- Provide a means to promote physical and mental health and well-being,
- Encourage community collaboration.

With this being our first year we knew we would learn a great deal from the five selected areas (The School, Churchyard, Bankside, Parson's Field Public Car Park and Stonewell Lane) - each area had a specific preparation and planting approach that allowed us to evaluate what works best in our local environment. What has been really encouraging is to see the number of wildflowers that have been growing in these areas, and across the wider village as well.

Counts in each of the areas during the summer months identified many different wildflowers including Cranesbill, Foxglove, Oxeye Daisy, Herb Robert, Devils Paintbrush, Harebell, False Baby's Breath and Hawkbit – many with beautiful flowers as well as interesting names! Not forgetting less glamorous but equally important plants such as Cow parsley, Plantain, Buttercups and Dandelions.

What has also been very positive this year has been the involvement from across the community – including the school who have been active and visible supporters of the wildflower initiative, and members of the village community in helping to prepare and maintain these areas. We've also had a lot of engagement and interest from many of you who



already have areas in gardens for wildflowers or would like to do more – something we want to build upon next year.

With the lessons learnt from this year, we agreed our areas of focus for next year, which are:

- Maintain and develop our existing 5 areas, plus the addition of a new area adjacent to the Farm Shop – thank you to all involved in supporting these areas for your help. Other community areas will certainly be considered should volunteers be willing to lead in developing those areas.
- Support the development of opportunities for the community to create wildflower/wildlife habitats in their own gardens/land. This is an initiative we will be working closely with the school on.

Again, in partnership with the school, develop a village wildflower trail, allowing residents and visitors alike to explore and see the range of wildflowers at first hand,

Work with Parish Council and Hartington Community Group to replace existing planters and develop “bee friendly- pollinators” plants in new containers.

**We have already started planning** next year's festival services which will include a Candlemas service at the beginning of February. If you have any plant pots that you are willing to donate for us to plant snowdrops and crocus so that we can use them to decorate the church for the service we would be very grateful for them.

**We continue to welcome knitted and crocheted flowers** for the jubilee flower tower. There are some patterns and wool at the back of the church. There are also a small selection of craft books at the back of the church for anyone looking for a new project. Please put any donations in the box in the wall by the door.

**The food bank box** is back at the back. We are working with Biggin School at a time when use of food banks has increased by 600 thousand across the UK since last year as families have found themselves in unexpected difficulties. Food banks provide a minimum of 3 days' emergency food and support to people experiencing crisis. To receive a food parcel, residents need to be referred to a food bank from children's centres, GPs, schools and a range of other advice agencies.

**Churchyard plan.** We continue to make progress in the churchyard. Biggin School came to look at the lichens in the churchyard and a member of the Lichen Society undertook a survey to add to our understanding of the ecosystem in God's Acre. A small team of volunteers have started recording the headstones. More sessions are planned. The wild daffodil bulbs have arrived. We now have the funds to maintain the trees in the churchyard which is a matter of urgency. It has been a long time since they were professionally pruned. The work may take up to a week. Larger bird boxes, bat boxes and an owl box will be installed at the same time. Temporary coverings are going to be placed over the rusted grates in the church walls to prevent unwelcome visitors from making themselves at home. These will be replaced in due course with new grates.

**Biggin C of E Primary School** How lovely it has been this term to get back to some of the things we enjoy doing at school most of all! Despite all the challenges last year, everyone has bounced back into school this September raring to go!

It's been amazing to get back to competitive sport with other schools again. Both Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 took part in Cross Country running events at Parwich. This was the first joint event with other local primary school children since February 2020. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed it and our runners did very well despite some stiff competition! We are in training for future events doing the Daily Mile each day in school and we're working on our stamina for longer distances. Next half term we hope to join the football events, too.



At the end of September, we joined a representative from the British Lichen Society for a field study in the churchyard at St Thomas' Parish Church. It was great to learn so much about the different types of lichen; crusty, bushy and leafy, from the expert. We had no idea there were so many varieties present in the churchyard and even confirmed there were a few more types living there since the last survey was completed. We learned how to use the special hand lenses and used our science skills to observe and categorise the lichens we found. We are now planning to continue the lichen study with a number of activities throughout the year to help complete an ecological survey for the church.

Finally, our gorgeous Year 6 children went to White Hall, an outdoor adventure centre near the Goyt Valley in Buxton. This is such an important event of our oldest children each year, giving them an opportunity to improve team-working and communication skills and develop their self-confidence and resilience right at the start of the year. It's also a huge amount of fun and very tiring! The children enjoyed lots of activities including the ropes course and zip wire, canoeing and rock scrambling as well as den building and night time games. Everyone made lots of new friends from Kniveton, Hartington and Parwich schools and are now ready for their next challenge!

Last Friday we joined some of the congregation at St Thomas' Parish Church so our traditional school Harvest Festival. Again, it has been a very long time since we have all been able to worship together. The children decorated a window in church and created display boards of their artwork, including pointillist

pumpkins and still life bread rolls, which looked stunning. The atmosphere in the festival church was warm, friendly and welcoming and we were very proud that every one of the children was able to contribute in some way, to the service. Reception and Year 1 said a short prayer and Year 3 and 4 created their own Harvest prayer in the form of an acrostic poem. Year 5 and 6 shared the readings and further poems written in school.
