- **Earl Sterndale** – The Church- School and Chapel.
- **Biggin** – the village hall with kitchen and parking and playing fields.
- **Hartington** – a village hall with high ceiling and School yard.

These venues are the base for the different activities- covering Derbyshire Dales- High Peak and Staffordshire Moorlands welcoming all in the area- from the south – Parwich and Alstonfield; the west – Warslow- Reapsmoor; the North - Longnor and Chelmorton; and the East -Pikehall- Monyash. The activities led and supported by local people, many volunteers.

Hartington Surgery Update Following on from the National GP Patient Survey that is sent out centrally by NHS England, Hartington can report that it has been rated within the top 5%, 283 out of a total of 6418 Practices. The survey rates several areas including 'how easy it was to speak to your GP by phone' and 'how helpful the receptionists were'. It is a useful tool to gauge patient satisfaction. If you do receive a GP Patient Survey in the post, please complete and return it. In-house patient satisfaction surveys are also available at the Surgery, called 'The NHS Friends and Family Test'. Your feedback is important and welcome.

Plans to increase physical activity and set up a local walking group have now linked in with existing groups within our community. There are, Hartington based, walking groups, on both Monday mornings and Thursday evenings. If you are interested in increasing your levels of exercise, meeting new people and improving your general health, further information is available from the Surgery or Hartington Community Group.

Tales of the Field -What a summer we've had! Glorious sunshine, storms and as usual in Biggin, very strong wind!

For those of you who are unfamiliar with 'Biggin wind' it's a phenomenon, an urban legend if you will, and I am now used to my weather app telling me "temperature 24 degrees but feels like 18 due to wind". If it's not tied down here, then it will blow away! My shed roof, many a trug, cushions and even a whole piece of rattan furniture has been blown away never to return (well I did get my shed roof back). My chickens hate the wind, you think they'd get used to it but no, they huddle together in their porch like they're waiting for the end of the world. My snooty Orpington, Mrs Haversham, hates it most of all, her petticoats being ruffled by the wind prompts a early bedtime to escape the shocking indignity of it all. For those of you familiar with the old film Moby dick, the scene where captain Ahab (played by Gregory Peck) is clutching his coat, trying desperately to walk against the wind and rain that's lashing against him, well that's me in January trying to get to my chickens with a plate of corn!

It's fair to say I have a love hate relationship with the wind. At times I despair of it, but I always admire its strength and purpose. It takes the dead leaves from the trees to allow room for the new buds, it carries the water from the oceans inland, and it dries my triple pegged washing beautifully. So, it appears, in typical brit fashion, I can talk about the Biggin wind for hours, I'd guess half the conversations I've had with my lovely neighbour over the wall have been about wind (the other half of our conversations are probably about guinea pigs and sheds). Hartington Village Pond At our July Parish Council meeting there was a prolonged discussion during the public speaking section about the state of the village pond. A very dry spring had meant both springs feeding the well had dried up and with little rainfall, water levels were extremely low. Discussing matters with the National Park and Environmental Health officers, they assured us this was common in ponds across the Park and indeed the Mere at Heathcote was similarly affected.

Our original plan had been to repair the crumbling concrete edges and damaged overflow outlet to the Stanner, during this summer and then try to remove as much silt as possible, in tankers during the winter months. However, at the meeting it was agreed and supported by the majority of public present, that if we took fast advantage of the abnormally low water levels, there was an opportunity to dig out and remove the silt. This was a method used by farmers over the preceding century and most recently in the 1970's and early 1980's.

In that period the pond had a natural clay lining and would dry out regularly in very dry spells. However, since the major refurbishment of the pond in 1994 when a new clay base was installed, protected by a fibre lining above and all the edges concreted and flagged, water retention has been dramatically improved. We discussed our plan with the National Park who were fully supportive and only concerned that we should try and protect the lining.

The following Tuesday our team assembled. The sheer volume of silt meant any hand digging operation was impractical, so we used a rubber tracked mini digger within the pond to remove silt into dumper trucks and trailers to be removed and

allowed to rot down. The Peak Parks Ponds Officer visited to witness the operation as this is now so rarely done within the National Park.

Although we had previously removed and re-homed the large carp that had been illegally placed in the pond, there were still some smaller fish and by nets and hand we managed to save a number of fingerling size fish, which we retained in natural water over the period.

Removing silt took all day and numerous trips, but by the end of Tuesday we were down to the sand and gravel which held down the membrane above the clay. In all we removed about 60 tons of silt. We also found the totally clogged cap for the central spring, a no parking sign and a very muddy street sign for Church Street which we cleaned and replaced in its original site.

On Wednesday we swept the pond base and removed a further 2 tons of silt, cleaned all the edges and waited for the 2.5 cubic metres of cement to repair the ponds badly broken edges. Concreting and a proper repair and sealing of the overflow, plus reseating the cover for the central spring, was completed during Wednesday and the concrete allowed to set overnight. Finally on Thursday we used a farm tanker to refill the pond with around 7,000 gallons of natural water and released the fish back into the pond, as it would have been illegal to release them anywhere else.

Many thanks to councillors Alan Grindey, Scott Wager and Richard Sherratt, to Ben Wager for expert Digger handling without damaging the liner, to Stuart Grindey, residents Martin Wooley, Philip Parker and Richard and Kate Craven, Councillor Sue Bruce for bacon butties, the staff of the Olde Cheese Shop for drinks and Sam Pilkington for use of his tanker.

A real team effort and despite current drought conditions the pond is holding up well, the ducks seem happy, and we look forward to it fully re-filling when the water table (hopefully) rises this autumn. David Annat

Wildflowers in Hartington Our latest volunteer day took place on Friday 5th August at the Youth Hostel and thank you to the fourteen volunteers who spent the day working on both the pond and orchard. Great progress was made clearing the areas, including the pond ahead of relining later this year to restore it to its former glory. Lots of nettles removed as well. We also carried out the first cut and rake of the grass in the orchard area.

Once the pond is restored, not only will it become a haven for wildlife again, but our intention is also to make it accessible both for guests of the Youth Hostel and members of the community to visit and take in the beautiful surroundings, with activities such as pond dipping taking place.

Organised in partnership with the lovely team at the Youth Hostel who provided hot drinks and lunch to keep us going, our volunteers came from near and far - Hartington to Birmingham, Crewe & North Yorkshire to name but a few. All agreed it was a very enjoyable day in a glorious location and further volunteer days are planned for later this year, anyone is welcome to join.

The pollinator friendly plants in the new village planters continue to do well, especially the herbs around the bus stop and if you need a sprig or two for cooking, please feel free to help yourself. Thanks again to the volunteers who have been keeping the planters watered – especially important over the hot summer months.

Across our other wildflower areas, lots of bees and butterflies have been seen taking full advantage of the flowers in bloom over the Summer, and as we move into early Autumn, plans will be made to cut back

where appropriate, followed by removal of cuttings to prevent too many nutrients returning to the soil (which wildflowers don't like too much of).

If you have any wildflower seeds you've collected and have some spare, we'd love to hear from you – we are currently collecting to give out to others across our community who want to grow wildflowers and will be giving out free seeds to those who visit our display at the Hartington Community Group event on the 5th September.

Finally, Hartington Wildflowers has recently featured in the local press as well as the Peak District website! With photos from the Bankside and Youth Hostel areas, we hope it will provide inspiration and ideas for others around the area to do similar in their gardens or land. The August draw for a £300 prize was our final one in the 2021/2022 cycle. The impact of our three lotteries, 2019/2020, 2020/2021 and 2021/2022 has been immense, providing the critical 'seed' money to bring in successful grant bids to bring about the refurbishment of the Hall.

At a special Hartington Community Group open meeting to be held on 5th September 2022 we are launching a third lottery for 2022/2023 with, as before, monthly prizes of £100, with bumper prizes of £500 in December 2022 and £300 in August 2023. The unwelcome water feature which has appeared on the west facing gable end wall of the Upper Bakehouse has dominated our property management thinking in recent months but with funding now secure for the repairs we will push ahead in the Autumn on the kitchen refurbishment. We expect that the kitchen refurbishment costs will be met from the 2021/2 and the new 2022/3 lottery monies.

Thank you to everyone who has supported us so well in the past three years – the lottery seed monies of £10K has been instrumental in bringing in over £60K in grants.
