THE 'JUG & GLASS INN' Part two

Nationwide, the mid19th century witnessed a rapid decline of 'Coaching Inns'; due mainly to the birth of railways. Locally, workers having sought sustenance during construction of the 'Cromford & High Peak' (C&HP) and 'London & North Western Railway' (L&NWR) lines now turned to new pastures on the job's completion. With diminished footfall taking its toll, early 20th Century days bought extra hardships as World War One (WW1) loomed on the horizon. Nonetheless, foresighted publicans had also become 'land-merchants', thus taking opportunities to furnish the country and its military with vital crops and hardware needed to prosper; as previously all had mostly been imported.

1925 The Naylor Family (Note clothing of the era – Teenage-son in best short trousers, knee-length socks



and hob-nailed boots. Floral top with long serge skirt and sacking over-pinnie. Thin Flannelette blouse with backfastening cotton pinafore for daughter. Full working garb for Wilf with obligatory pipe and 'best-market hob-nailed boots,' whilst their Cow/Sheepdog bids a hasty retreat with his prized catch-of-the-day.

Sometime before WW1 Wilf Naylor became landlord. On his departure around 1926 Thomas Rowarth Senior held the property for some 60 years. Family recalls when his daughter-in-law gave birth on 17th March,1933 the midwife was fetched from Parwich via tractor transport. Meanwhile a month onwards on 22nd April, 1933 the Dunn family's vehicle – a car – was stolen from the farm entrance some half a-mile away northwards.

1934 bought further grief to the doorstep when: a well-loved, respected, hard-working local and 'Master Wall Builder' visited 'The Newhaven House Hotel' for sustenance. But, following a somewhat lengthy visit, Joes' session was 'closed' by the then landlord. Although remaining jovial, Joe undeterred, set forth – on foot – for 'The Jug.' However unfortunately, he would never reach his yearned for destination. Joe was struck by a motor vehicle yards from the door. Consequently, this beloved character died from injuries sustained on 29th September, 1934. During life Joe lived with his brother George Wood in a meagre wooden dwelling beside the old Wesleyan Chapel in nearby Biggin. Joe was interred in St. Thomas' cemetery alongside other family members.

Further misfortune lurked. Young Winston Dunn aged 4 years sadly drowned having fallen in a drinkingwater Meer, south of 'Newhaven Lodge Farm' on 27th November, 1934. Neighbours from 'The Jug,' 'Leanlow Farm' and Parsley Hay' rallied forth as did John Bob Sherratt, from Hartington – who recorded many events in his diaries kept during 1933-35. Around this time the Rowarth family moved to take charge of 'The Newhaven House Hotel.'

William and Alice Mycock held tenancy of 'The Jug' around 1939, before leaving to settle and work at nearby 'Hartington Station'. They lived here for many years raising their family and thereafter – for a short period – were succeeded by Mr & Mrs Bishop.

The outbreak of WW2 saw hardship locally and nationally; at this time the tenant of 'The Jug,' was Clifford Dunn and his family

On 10th April, 1943 a Vickers Armstrong Bomber, Wellington MkIII, DF 611/W of OUT crashed on a training flight.

Believed to be Canadians, the crew had taken off on an infrared bombing exercise. According to Cliffs' daughter Hilda, she was awakened by the noise at 05.30 hours and ran to her bedroom window. She saw the plane flying far too low before it careered across the A515 landing in a field on Blakemoor some 400 vards north from 'The Jug' on the



opposite side. As noted by Alan Clarke https://www.peakdistrictaircrashes.co.uk/crashsites/peakdistrict) reportedly an engine failed and the pilot Flight Sergeant Ronald Albert Jones had attempted an emergency

and 23 years old rear-gunner Flight Sergeant John Douglas had been thrown clear of the wreckage. The rear gun-turret had been catapulted off from the main fuselage to roll back behind 'The Jug'. Remarkable it left John Douglas with relatively few injuries.

Memories of that day remained. Remembered by the crews Families and by families of helping rescuers; including William and Alice Mycock of Hartington

Station. In 1982, Having settled in Carlisle, John

Douglas travelled to 'The Jug' for a re-union with Hilda Kirkham (nee Dunn). "A wonderful lady", he said,

"who had given up her bed for him on that fateful night in 1943".

It doesn't mean that living lives of thankfulness ignores sufferings or that the suffering of others doesn't matter, because they do matter. There is a time to laugh and a time to cry. So many people say they mustn't

grumble and imply that their sufferings are too small to be of value compared to other people's. Which is not true as all our struggles and sufferings matter to God, however small they are. Paul understood that if we can learn to be positive and thankful during the good times, then that will help to sustain us through the bad times. He was in prison when he wrote to the Ephesians. Being thankful didn't diminish his hardship, but it did help him to endure it.

Each new day brings with it a new beginning and a challenge. So perhaps we can be challenged to be thankful! To make the effort to see the positive in a situation rather than the downside. To stop being critical and give thanks instead. And I think that if we can do that, we'll discover that whatever life may bring, it will be the better for having consciously tried to live it in an attitude of thankfulness.

Surgery Update - Flu vaccines - are reverting to the same criteria as before Covid. It is being offered to:

- : all patients 65 years and over
- : patients aged 6 months to under 65 in clinical risk groups
- : children aged 2 or 3 on 31^{st} August 2023
- : pregnant women

Flu vaccines are ordered and should arrive at the Practice by mid-September (as long as there are no manufacturing or delivery problems that will cause delays). This year we aim to offer pre-booked appointments for flu vaccines, at a variety of times during the day, including late evenings on Mondays, to assist working patients who may struggle to attend during regular working hours. All eligible patients will receive an invite to book an appointment. We will use the Hartington Surgery Patient Participation Group Facebook page to add information about when we will be starting to administer the vaccines.

I am in the process of planning something to make up for it so watch this space, just going to have some time to recover first. (A potential return to the Balkans later this summer or next to finish off..?)

My enthusiastic over planting back in May, (remember when we actually had sunshine) I planted enough peas to feed possibly the whole village, I work on a theory when planting of one for me-one for the chickens, but this year I've got so many peas they clearly didn't eat as many budding shoots as usual or they've wised up to the fact that I give them the grown peas as treats anyway! Other success stories ...Salad leaves were tremendous and so were edible flowers and chillies. And after seeing a friend's glorious greenhouse (with the best greenhouse view ever) full of the tomato plants, my tomato envy got the better of me and I purchased a ridiculous cupboard sized tomato greenhouse online but what a success! For the first time ever, I have actually succeeded in growing tomatoes! Onto the Failures, definitely radish but only partial failure as when they went so leggy with all the rain and into flower they looked very pretty and the butterflies loved them, so they were immediately forgiven.

I do have challenging conditions here for my slightly ambitious and enthusiastic mini allotment, the wind can be bitter across the fields, and we have more rain than sunshine, not to mention rogue chicken attacks on my seedlings. But I still adore being in the garden, it's my solace after a tough day and I can usually be found pottering aimfully of an evening, glass of wine and secateurs in my hand sipping and snipping. My garden isn't to everyone's taste, I have wild flowers and sweet peas clambering over a vintage bike used as a plant support, pots are often old metal buckets and I love my craft shed with its wavy roof that's still slightly wonky after a storm, it's a perfect spot to plan my next gardening project, create or just read without the distraction of the internet (which doesn't reach that far). My garden has come a long way from the bare patch of mud, grass and buried junk I faced when I moved in. It's now a real garden that's used and loved and as all gardens should, it will evolve and grow with my family. So as summer draws to a close, enjoy the last of the sunshine and flowers, whether it's the shared spaces in our villages, a view through a window or a fully planted garden that's all yours to do as you wish. I hope you feel blessed, as I do, to have such a safe and beautiful spaces to wander, dolly daydream and breathe.

Childrens corner As the summer turns to winter, we can start to plan how we can help the bugs and beetles make it through winter. I always like to make bug hideaways in corners of the garden where they can snooze away the winter in safety. A plant pot is the perfect holiday home, and you can fill the plant pot with things you can easily collect on a walk around the villages, pinecones, sheep wool, sticks, leaves - they'll create a perfectly snug snoozing spot for your bug and beetle guests to enjoy when things get chilly. Send photos of your bug hotels into news and views and you may appear in the next issue!

Joint village 'Environment' section Helping local wildlife. As we move into early autumn, now is a great time to start thinking about how to help our local wildlife ahead of winter. Provide food and shelter for wildlife, now and in preparation for next year. Clean all your bird feeders to avoid the spread of disease to winter migrants and put up a nest box well in advance of breeding season. A nest box could also prove a cosy spot for small birds to spend the night on particularly cold winter evenings ahead. Do you have space in your garden for a habitat pile? Piles of logs, branches or leaves provides a home to a range of invertebrates or for hibernating hedgehogs. Leave plants in the garden uncut over autumn and winter – the seed heads provide food, and the stems and dead leaves are good for hibernating insects.

Hartington Wildflower Group. Youth Hostel pond area now open to all. After 18 months of hard work to restore the Youth Hostel pond, it is now again open to all visitors. Why not pay a visit and enjoy one of the best views of the village from one of the benches? Access through the main car park (via the gate with a painting from one of our local residents, Jennie Dullage). Thanks to the hard work from many volunteers from Hartington Wildflowers and the YHA team it has now been restored to its former glory, and we welcomed the return of smooth newts to the pond recently which is sign of its good health. Wildflowers that have lain dormant for many years have now also returned, complemented by additional planting of local native species.

Work will continue to maintain and further improve the area, including plans to open up the pond for pond dipping activities. If you do pay a visit, please be respectful to the area and its neighbours by only walking on the designated paths.

Autumn maintenance on our wildflower areas We will be carrying out a variety of maintenance tasks on our wildflower areas during autumn, if you'd like to help out, please get in touch via the contact details below.

Toad patrol around the Mere in the spring A meeting with a representative from the Derbyshire Reptile and Amphibian Group gave us lots of good suggestions for how we might help look after the toads and frogs as they migrate to the Mere towards the end of March next year. We are attempting to understand the main routes they take on their journey – so if you've noticed toads around the Mere area, especially on the roads, do let us know.

Gilbert Wilton- 100th Birthday- There is going to be something to celebrate in the Wilton family on the 9th October 2023. Gilbert will be 100 years old. He was born in Monyash on the 9th October 1923. Seventh child of John William and Jane Ann Wilton. The family left Monyash in 1928 to live at Cheapside, Back Lane, Biggin.

Gilbert was called up for service in the Royal Navy in 1942, he was a wheelhouse and compass operator, and a radar operator, along with a few other duties. He served on the HMS Baynton and then HMS Deane. He took part in the Atlantic and Artic convoys, for which he has since received his campaign medals including three from our Russian allies of the time.

Three brothers served during this time of war, Victor with 53rd Reconnaissance, Ambrose with RASC, and Gilbert with the Royal Navy. Unfortunately, their much-loved brother Victor was killed in action on February 28th 1945.

In 1952 Gilbert married Audrey, they lived in Hartington firstly at the cottage on the dale and secondly at Hillcrest Hall Bank. Two of their three sons were born in Hartington.

They moved to Drury Lane in 1959 where David was born. They were married for 59 years before Audrey passed away in 2011. David's passing was another blow in January 2020.

Gilbert remains very independent in his own home on Drury Lane supported by Tony and Alan and their families. He's looking forward to a party to be held on his behalf by his family on Sunday 8th October. The whole Wilton family are very proud of him and wish him a very happy birthday. **Coffee, cake and chat** will resume on the last Thursday of September between 2-4 at the village hall. We have a small grant from Derbyshire Dales to progress the parish map. In November we will be offering people the opportunity to make a Christmas table decoration including a candle. There will be a charge of £15 for this workshop. Hartington Community Group (HCG) requires a new Secretary to take on the role from February 2024. This is a voluntary role working alongside the Chair, Vice Chair and Treasurer to help co-ordinate all the group activities and events going on in Hartington and the local area - recent examples include the successful King's Coronation Celebration weekend in May and the open evening for all groups and activities held in the village hall last September.

You will be taking over the role from me, Liz Hitch, and I am very happy to support you through this. **It is absolutely not an onerous task.** It requires a bit of organisation and a knowledge of Word and emails and access to a printer. Once a year in February we hold an AGM to which we invite all members of HCG. Members include group leaders and individuals who are keen to support the activities through the year. The secretary would need to take minutes (I prefer to call them notes) and distribute them to everyone in HCG via email, some require a hard copy.

We hold a general meeting once a year open to all members of the community, which follows the AGM, and is where we plan community events for the year. We meet as a committee (Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary and Treasurer) once every six weeks for an hour to keep on top of. I take notes at these committee meetings, in particular a note of the actions, so that we keep track of what we are doing. Pomeroy War Memorial Hall As a trust we have been working towards restoring Pomeroy Memorial Hall and bringing it back into public use. We carried out an extensive feasibility study and had very positive feedback from the local community that the hall should remain as a memorial and a public facility.

As a memorial, the foundation stones around the base of the hall bear the names of those who were involved in building the hall, either as builders, those who donated money or goods or those who served on the committee. The names of the fallen are not marked here but are included on the memorial in Earl Sterndale church yard. We would like to rectify this with memorials to the fallen of Pomeroy and Sterndale Moor at the hall.

The hall has not been used as a community building for many years. It therefore requires considerable restoration including upgrading the electricity and water supply and installing a septic tank. The ground and car park have become overgrown. The committee are now in the process of clearing the overgrowth from the entrance and car park.

The ground is thought to include a Roman road so before excavation can be carried out for a septic tank a full archaeological investigation will need to be undertaken. We are currently looking for suitable archaeological experts to carry out this work. We have planning permission for work to the actual building but currently not to improve access to the hall from the main road and this will restrict future use.

Renovating a building over 100 years old and constructed of limestone will need to be carried out by conservation builders experienced in working with traditional materials.

The hall, despite being built as a community facility with public contributions of money material and labour, has never been registered as a charitable trust. Registering as a charity has become more difficult and expensive - but without registered charity status it is difficult to attract funding. We continue to work towards the most cost-effective ways of registering as a trust and upgrading the hall and grounds but there are considerable constraints (as above).

If we can't use the hall, it will not be viable to do the renovation work. We will not be able to make enough money to maintain it and without a viable business plan we will not be able to attract future funding. We would welcome any help with building, archaeology or general volunteering to help with our work at the hall.

If you have any photographs, memories or anecdotes connected with Pomeroy for our Pomeroy book, we would love to hear from you. We also welcome your thoughts on the future of the hall and what could be done with the building and the land.
