#### THE 'JUG & GLASS INN' Part Three



This series has awoken many forgotten memories amongst local communities. Many are fondly remembered, especially for Hartington resident, Audrey Smith. Apparently (at Cliffs request), Audreys' Mum and Brother appeared on the Dunn family photograph.

Using her trustworthy little car, Lil Kavanagher regularly delivered supplies to outlying areas; pre-ordered from her small 'General Store' on Church Street Hartington. Standing far right, front row, she is pictured clutching her never-to-be-parted-from

money-purse. She is accompanied by son Derek who usually worked at 'Bassetts Garage' (Mollatts), also situated then on Church Street. Derek is best remembered as a 'School-taxi' driver who whilst journeying toand-fro to scattered hamlets, never ceased serenading his young passengers with renditions of Guy Mitchells 'Pretty Little Black Eyed Susie' song.

Post war, more recent landlords include Tom and Dorothy Spencer and Ted and Nina Wilks during the 1950/60s.

Historically popular days to visit 'The Jug' was Bakewell Market Day, held weekly on Mondays. When concluding trade, 'sellers', 'dealers' and locals trek homewards, calling-in to satisfy their appetites whilst



passing. Whilst waiting to be served they plied their left-over goods. Many bargains were acquired, changing hands, free of 'luck-money', vouched for by 'spit-on-handshake' techniques still practiced today.

When bartending, Ted forever cheerful would practice his Bradley Walsh/ Lily Savage conversation acts. His pantomime antics were loved by all. When serving food-of-the-day he would be supported by his wife Nina, a modern-day Sarah Millican type. Nonetheless, arguments occurred, Teds mediation skills came to the fore. Built like a Japanese sumo wrestler, when tested he firmly but gently promoted amicable solutions before discharging affected parties who often continued to call frequently. Nightly entertainment such as 'Whist/Beetle Drives' occurred regularly to raise money for local charities. On other occasions two Darts and Domino teams competed in local Leagues. Weekend 'Sing-a-longs' attracted local musicians

like 'The Happy Wanderers', 'Top Country Sound', 'The Manifolds' and our own 'Yodelling Milkman' 'Keith Manifold'. They provided atmospheres rarely matched today. Mostly prior to introduction of 'Drink Driving Laws' on 7<sup>th</sup> October, 1967.



The Jug' is almost, entirely surrounded by panoramic views, especially during favourable months. Alternatively, harsher periods weatherwise can be notorious. On January 8th, 1966, thick rolling-fog encompassed the area. Certainly, contributing to 'life-loss' of one young Hartington housewife and mother. Regretfully, whilst delivering supplies, the vehicle in which she travelled as passenger was struck by another. Unparalleled within days, similar weather conditions attributed to a young 19 years old motor- cyclists death. Born at Parsley Hay, he worked at Hartshead Quarry near Heathcote some half mile from 'The Jug'. That day, his mission was to fetch lunchtime refreshments from the inn for colleagues, en-route he collided with the rear of a lorry. He died instantly and the first witness on scene was another lorry driver returning to reload at the works. Ironically, he was the husband of the young wife who had died just days earlier.

These events heavily affect Ted psychologically resulting in an early retirement Future licensees included Barbara Jones and family 1972-77, followed by the Clay family and thereafter John Bryan. Barbaras' son Paul

regularly played his guitar in the evenings. However, the most famous overnight guests were 'Rod Stewart and

the Faces' as reported by a 'Derby Telegraph' journalist. When she called there, Rod and friends had been stranded on their way to a 'Buxton Festival'. But meanwhile they held court and drank champagne. Rod was later overheard acclaiming that he was not always of a charitable mind.

Around 1995 a serious fire occurred and following demise of The Jug' the Easom family purchased the property in 1996. Andrew and Yvonne began a new phase for the 'old coaching inn '.

Nine 'Bed and Breakfast rooms were added and following a further disruptive fire, closure, and a need to recoup after a mismanaged tenancy, refurbishment afforded the Easoms – on their retirement – leasing 'The Jug' & Glass Inn' to Daryll and Vicky Bonsall in 2018.

Born within a mile radius, both had been educated and worked within the Peak District National Park. Experienced in 'Camping', 'Leisure' and 'Hospitality' industries, both are pro-active and forward thinking. Their working ethos attracts a world-wide audience; even through a difficult global period, business flourishes.



Every visitor, old or new is offered a warm, friendly welcome. The public always comes first assuring an enjoyable stay for all. Opening 12 - 7 daily, callers may dine on traditional 'Sunday Lunch', 'Lunch' 'Evening Meal or 'Snacks' whether alone, with family or friends. Both hosts and staff are passionate about serving home-cooked food, made with locally sourced meats and seasonal vegetables. Importantly dietary needs are to the fore.

Newly introduced, well-behaved dogs are welcomed in bar areas and four accommodation rooms. However, dining and kitchen areas are no-go. In Summer 2021 Johnathon Wrather of Coronation Street (2003-4) and Emmerdale (2016-17) fame visited with family. Dining in they regularly walk or cycle around the area.

Having a wide knowledge of amenities locally, visitors can be sure their needs are catered for. No one leaves unhappy. Daryll and Vicky are acutely aware of the loyal, local community, supporting all environmental issues whatever the weather, they are there twenty-four seven. **Vicar Letter-** November is the remembering month. We begin the month by celebrating All Saints and then, of course, there are our Acts of Remembrance around Armistice Day

Remembering can be a bittersweet thing. When we remember, it is often with the joy of a cherished time being brought back to our minds, but with the sadness that that time is now past - that it can only be revisited in our memories. The memories themselves (perhaps triggered by a certain sight or smell or sound or date) bring a smile to our faces, but they often come tied up with a ribbon of grief because some of the people at the heart of that memory have died. It is important that we accept that in life there are times when we hold both joy and pain together because both the joy and the pain come from loving. If we didn't love, we wouldn't grieve.

The death of a loved one is incredibly painful, and we may also we may find ourselves grieving other things too. We might be struggling with all sorts of other losses at the moment -a relationship, a job, or health to name but a few.

And it strikes me that at the heart of any grief, is a looking back to how things were knowing that they can't be the same again, and in time we need to come to terms with a new way of being – a way we didn't plan for and don't expect. And so, when we remember, we must be careful not to get stuck in our longing for the past. Our remembering must be part of our re-forming, our re-grouping, our re-emerging.

For many the words of Psalm 23 provide comfort. The psalmist speaks of walking through the darkest valley – safely with the presence of God. God is there when it feels darkest and because he is there, there is light. Maybe just a flicker at first. In time the light grows, and it calls us forward helping us to find new ways to be, new ways to live with and despite our loss, new ways to find the balance between joy and pain. It is no accident, I think, that our season of remembering moves into our Advent season of waiting for the light – and ultimately the explosion of the light into the world at Christmas, the light that is Jesus. My prayer is that you will trust that his light is there for you, today and always. *The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it (John 1:5)* 

**Anna Chaplain** On September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2023, something wonderful happened to me - I was commissioned in St Giles Church by Rev'd Adele, our priest in charge, to become Sarah Lacey - Anna Chaplain to the White Peak and Youlgreave Group of Churches. It is something that I have felt God's Holy Spirit nudging me to do for some considerable time, and I completed my ministry training earlier this year.

What is Anna Chaplaincy? Anna Chaplaincy for Older People, to give it the full title provides training and support to individuals and churches who want to offer skilled, compassionate spiritual care among older people, including those living with dementia, and their careers. Anna Chaplains, like me, are here to be a voice for and walk beside older people of strong, little or no faith, to let them know they are valued and cared for, to be of service.

Anna Chaplaincy is part of BRF Ministries, and from small beginnings in 2014, the network has grown to over 300 Anna Chaplains (I think I am 290 - something!) The vision remains to have an Anna Chaplain in every small and medium sized community throughout the U.K. My fellow chaplains who underwent training at the same time were from all over the British Isles, we are spreading, and I think I am correct in saying that I am the first in Derby Diocese, but please God, others will come. I know it will take time to become known to people too, as I cover a wide area, so I plan on starting small and local. Hartington, Biggin and Earl Sterndale are my starting 'blocks' as I am already visiting older people in these three villages, and I am hoping for more people to be made known to me.

The ministry is growing well countrywide, and I'm looking forward to developing all of its spiritual potential by walking besides, and supporting, the older members of our rural communities, that is once I have found them and they have invited me in to their lives. I am called to be an advocate - a voice - for any older person living within our 10 parishes, who might be isolated and lonely, perhaps unable to attend their church anymore, thus making them feel forgotten, undervalued and missing out on life. I'm here to offer to visit, at home, hospice or care home, to chat and really listen, to offer a time of prayer, if wanted, or just to 'be' with them - and make a cuppa!

We all know how the recent pandemic affected people's lives, especially for older people, loneliness hurts and can cause real pain, particularly when the end of our earthly life is drawing to a close.

My prayer is to be able to take this special ministry out to all older people in need, and their carers. Build up a network of volunteers in each village called Anna Friends, who will continue to visit and support them.

In time I hope to bring our older community members together for social gatherings, hold a yearly service celebrating the wisdom that comes with age, and learn from their experiences.

Anna Chaplains want to reach out to older people within society, many of whom feel undervalued. That may not be the case in our villages where families offer support to their loved ones. There will be those who are alone, please help me to find them. As Anna Chaplain I want to help any older person who feels isolated, perhaps in spiritual need. I won't come bible bashing, I'm here to serve and to minister, if asked to come. As Anna Chaplain I would very much like to be told of anyone who will be on their own and might like a visit over the Christmas period. **Hartington Surgery update-** Hartington Surgery is part of the **High Peak Primary Care Network (PCN)** and works in collaboration with neighbouring High Peak Practices. In order to support Practices to deliver care in the most efficient manner, PCN, members work together to assign, fund and manage additional clinical input to benefit all patients who are registered within High Peak PCN. So far these additional roles and responsibilities include:-

**Home Visiting Service** to ensure appropriate requests for home visits from housebound, and acutely unwell patients, are made in a timely manner by a trusted team of specialist clinicians who liaise closely with Practices. Every request for a home visit is passed on to the duty GP, at the Surgery, who then assesses/triages each call and books the home visit with the most suitable person within the PCN team.

**Physiotherapists** are booked directly by Surgery Receptionists and can offer both telephone, face to face and Zoom physio appointments. This helps to streamline your care and get you to the most appropriate person as quickly as possible without you having to speak to your GP first to ask him to refer you on to this service.

**Social Prescribers** can signpost patients to a vast range of care and support services which are most suited to their individual health and social care needs.

**Pharmacists** support Practices with Medicines Management queries, prescribing medication following hospital discharge, structured medication reviews and changes to medication.

**Mental Health Practitioners** provide mental health assessment and care planning for low to moderate mental health needs and make timely intervention to prevent hospital admission. They liaise closely with Clinicians and Pharmacists and can signpost, and refer, to other services.

**Hartington Surgery is pleased to report that it has received the top GP Patient Survey results in Derbyshire** and is amongst the top ten in the Midlands region. 97% describe their overall experience of this GP practice as good. The GP Patient Survey is sent out by the NHS to a random selection of patients. The survey assesses patients' experiences of healthcare services provided by GP practices, including experience of access to GP practices, making appointments and the quality of care received from healthcare professionals. #### Joint Village environment section

## **Making your own compost for the garden.** Have you thought about making your own compost but don't have the space?

If you've only got a small space, put leaves in a black plastic bag and leave them to break down into compost. It's a slow process but can be speeded up by adding two shovels of garden soil to the bag to provide microbes to break down the leaves and a shovel of manure that's high in nitrogen. Water the contents to increase activity. It'll take between 6 and 12 months for the leaves to decompose. An alternative to this is to use an open compost heap or a compost bin if you do have space. Leaf compost is rich in minerals, will benefit microbes in the soil and can be used in place of wood chips as a mulch. It reduces rain runoff, helps to control weeds and works to regulate soil temperature and although it might take longer it's a cheaper alternative to buying either mulch or compost.

Whenever you remove compost from your bin or bag, always check for any wildlife that might be hiding in there

**Helping our local Hedgehogs** - Seen a hedgehog lately? Numbers are in serious decline in rural areas – numbers have fallen by 50% since the millennium. They usually hibernate between November and March, and there are lots of things you can do to help them in your garden, including:

• Leave a corner of your garden "wild",

• Make sure your garden is connected - with gaps in any fences - so hedgehogs can move between green space,

- Check hedges and undergrowth before strimming or clipping,
- Make a home for hedgehogs to hibernate.

**Hartington Wildflower Group. Looking after our Village Wildflower Planters** Thank you to everyone who volunteered again this year to water and care for the village planters throughout the summer months. We've continued to get positive feedback from residents and visitors alike about how lovely they are, and you may have noticed some posters on the herb planters near the bus stop inviting people to help themselves to the herbs, which I know some of you close the village centre have done. It's also been encouraging to see the numbers of pollinators around the planters again this year. As we move into the winter months, there will be some general maintenance & tidying up that will be done, but we will want to leave seed heads etc for the wildlife as much as possible.

Wildflower stall at the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Village Trail celebration - 13<sup>th</sup> October The Wildflower group had a very enjoyable afternoon at the 10th Anniversary of the Hartington Village Trail celebrations in the village hall. We had a range of wildflower plants donated by residents which were a great success as well raising £27 which will go to support our wildflower project.
