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# The War Memorials of Biggin, Earl Sterndale and Hartington

The annual Remembrance Services will be held in our three communities on Sunday November 10<sup>th</sup> These important events mark the sacrifice of so many as we approach a centenary of their installation in Biggin, Earl Sterndale and Hartington

## **Biggin**

The memorial at the junction of Main Street and Drury Lane (formerly Green Lane) overlooks the main Entrance to St Thomas's Church. It is a pink granite obelisk was "publicly funded" and erected as inscribed "To honour those who fell for Liberty" The names are inscribed in gold letters on three of the faces of the obelisk. No unveiling date has been found.

THE GREAT WAR 1914-1918 Erected by public effort in affectionate memory of the fallen The Memorial has a Granite base topped with a square pedestal (with inscriptions), on top of which is a tall column. It is located in the grounds of St Michael & All Angels Churchyard. Inscriptions were recorded by Alf Beard on 18th May 2004, and verified against those contributed by Jean Durbin on 25th May 2004.

The WW2 memorial stone with 2 names was unveiled by the Duke of Devonshire in 1945 – The wall was rebuilt and trees replanted in 1986. The memorial





was listed, Grade II, as a Building of Special Architectural or Historic Interest in 2009

In case you are interested in how I got to this point, here are few biographical details:-

- My husband Donal and I have been married for 31 years. We are blessed with two children, now 24 and 27 years old and starting to make their own way in the world. My hobbies (when I make the time) include sailing, walking, playing the violin and sewing.
- Throughout my life, and various ups and downs, I have a strong sense that God always provides, although not of course always in the way one imagined he would! My husband and children have taught me a lot about the power of love.
- Before ordination in June 2020, I was an Associate Professor in Engineering Materials, first at the University of Bristol and then at the University of Nottingham. (Donal is still Professor of Bioengineering at the University of Nottingham).
- I didn't recognise a call to ministry until about 10 years ago when acting as the lay lead in PMC (Partnership for Missional Change) in my home parish. Announcement from Julie Coles the Practice Manager. It's with sadness that I wish to announce my official retirement, due to ill health, at the end of this month from my role as Practice Manager at Hartington Surgery. Many of you will know me but some of you will have never heard of me as I'm often in 'my little box at the back'. I started working for Doctors Bradbury, Hurst and Woods back in 2001 then later on for Hurst and Hurst (Gill and Graham Hurst) I have had a number of roles before becoming Practice Manager in 2008. Although those Doctors have now retired, Hartington was lucky enough to be taken over by Dr Dawson who continues to listen to patients, engage with the community and provide excellent clinical care. Over the years, I have seen the Practice develop and grow into something to be very proud of as demonstrated by the latest NHS GP patient survey which places Hartington as the top Practice in the whole of the East Midlands. It's good to be 'going out' on a high.

I have worked alongside some lovely people, many of which I class as close friends as well as colleagues. The friendship and teamwork at Hartington cascades into the level of service provided.

Primary Care and the role of GP Surgeries has changed immensely over the years due to ever changing Government agendas. When I first started, GP's were still writing on the little cards in your Lloyd George brown envelopes. These had to be got out, and put away, for every clinic. Surgery appointment lists were still handwritten, and all correspondence was via paper and had to be filled each day. Receptionists took all calls, including prescription orders and checked outgoing prescriptions.

Moving to more streamlined, electronic systems has not come without its challenges but change is inevitable and necessary and has put the Practice in a good place to face the future.

I will miss my job very much and hadn't planned on retiring just yet, but I plan on spending my retirement getting well again then doing all those things that I have never had time to do and spending time with my evergrowing family with a third grandchild due next year. I'm reliably informed by those that have already retired that I will wonder how I ever found time to go to work.

I am confident that Hartington Surgery will continue to grow and maintain the high standards that it has done so well to achieve and that patients will continue to benefit from high standards of health care in a practice that puts people first. It was well attended and a great opportunity for Biggin, Earl Sterndale, Hartington, Parwich, Sterndale Moor and Pomeroy to meet and understand the potential opportunities and support available as part of this network. The importance of knowing and valuing your people/volunteers, the range of skills they have and how to engage with them to strengthen their capacity to create opportunities meeting the needs of the various age groups.

In the new year it is hoped that Hartington Village Hall will build on what has been started here, creating opportunities for those who have already engaged to develop appropriate activities within their own context

Under the umbrella of Connex Community Support, "The Readycall" team plan to work with Hartington and the wider communities. They plan to grow the range of social activities and support already on offer to bring people together, make new connections and friendships within their wider communities, helping to build resilience and combat social isolation.

**READYCALL lives on!** After almost a year of uncertainty around the future of our Readycall service, I am delighted to be able to tell you that we have now had the wonderful news that our second funding application to the National Lottery's 'Reaching Communities Fund' was successful which will now allow us to sustain and grow the service over the coming 3 years.

Alongside this, we have also been successful with our grant application to the St James' Place Charitable Trust. This funding, also for 3 years, will enable us to continue to provide more focussed support to people affected by

The grants mean that we can grow the service to involve more volunteers and to support many more people throughout the Derbyshire Dales, helping older and vulnerable people to be socially connected within their community and to be able to retain their independence for longer.

The values at the core of Readycall have not and will not change - we will continue to provide tailored befriending and practical support to older people, helping to reduce isolation and building resilience for those we support. And we will be growing the range of social activities and opportunities we offer, bringing people together to make new connections and friendships.

# Hartington Town Quarter Parish Council War Memorial

The new stone and information plaque are now in place ahead of Remembrance Day. This completes the major refurbishment of the areas surrounding this important monument, including the replacement of the trees, oak posts, flags and rear curbing.

#### **Phone Box**

A special information board with pictures and historical information about the War Memorial is to be installed within the refurbished box.

**Affordable Homes** We note work has finally recommenced on finishing the four Affordable Homes on Dairy Close. We have therefore written to the Head of Planning asking once again that

these are either marketed at the reduced rental rate (as originally proposed) or at the reduced sale rates as determined by the District Valuer as embodied in the agreement between Amos Holdings and The Peak Park. So far, we have seen no sign of the marketing at the reduced prices he stipulated. The Valuer determined a sale price for Plot I – small two bed - £217,750, Plots H & W – 2/3 bed inner terrace – £250,000, Plot V – £227,500. Unfortunately, with no housing association involved, but being sold direct by the developer, there is no opportunity for a shared ownership purchase to make the homes truly affordable.

**Neighbourhood Plan** Everything is on our website including all associated documents. All have been delivered to the Peak Park who are still awaiting a final response to the Habitats and Environmental Statements from Natural England and the Environmental Agency. These must be received in writing before it can go before Planning Committee.

Our thanks to the Steering Group who have worked tirelessly to reach this stage and we are all frustrated that September and October Planning Committee timetables have passed and we trust response will be received in time for Novembers Officer's report. If approved by Committee it will then open another public consultation stage via the planning authority and a planning Inspector's review with any amendments necessary before it goes to a village referendum probably in Spring next year.

New Local Plan The new local plan which updates both Core Policy and Development Management Policies is now available for public consultation. Any member of the public can access on the Peak Park website and complete their own response online or sent comments to the Parish Council who will incorporate them with their own response ahead of the end of November deadline. Of course if our Neighbourhood Plan is accepted by the village ahead of the completion date of the new Local Plan in becomes part of planning legislation specifically for this village.

Parish Council Vacancy and Election Firstly, may we thank our long serving member Liz Broomhead MBE who has chosen to step down from the Council having made a massive contribution and with her many other roles within this community often provided an irreplaceable link between us and other village groups. She will be greatly missed by her fellow councillors. Thank you Liz. Liz's resignation created a 'casual vacancy' for a single councillor which was advertised but no nominations were received by the Council who

would normally select a candidate to fill the position until the next parish council elections in May 2027. However, during this period, more than the 10 residents required by statute, wrote to DDDC requesting a full election take place to fill this vacancy. This is highly unusual for a single vacancy but means if more than one qualifying candidate has been received by the electoral team at DDDC by the closing date for nominations on 18th October, a full election for the single vacancy will take place in the Village Hall on 14th November. This is an extremely costly exercise (DDDC estimate around £2,000 from our council funds) and will involve polling cards and postal votes to all on the electoral register. Please therefore make it a priority to attend any election and use your vote so that as wide a representation as possible of our whole community is reflected in the election result.

Wells Dressing - Thank you to everyone who helped make the Well this year a success. It was a relief to have volunteers prepare the clay properly getting stuck in (literally) with bare feet. The consistency of the clay was perfect making the dressing so much easier and allowing the Well to stay up that much longer. We had a constant trickle of people helping dress the Well in the village hall, and then 10 days later another team laboriously removed the seeds and petals from the clay so the clay can be recycled for another year. We sent a donation to the RNLI for £250 for which they are very grateful.

The School Well was also stunning, and it was encouraging to know that every child contributed to the making of it. Thank you again and look forward to seeing you same time next year! Lucy

**Hartington Village Hall:** Our AGM was held on 16<sup>th</sup> October. Draft accounts were presented as well as a review of further improvements to the building. Hire income over 2023/4 has risen to £17,560, which is so encouraging to see so many of our community engage with one or more activities, with total expenditure being £37,943. Fund raising, donations and grants enabled us to declare an overall profit on the year of £7,410. The major building improvement was the refurbishment of toilets at a cost of £18,378 with a grant from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund accounting for 75% of the total.

Since September we have seen James Wheawall, joiner, install new hand built, insulated rear fire exit doors with a grant from the National Lottery paying for 53% of the cost. This week Matlock Glass replaced blown window panes in the Main Hall as well as four replacement window frames with the cost being met from our lottery income.

We are grateful to Dave Baggley for donating and installing a retractable large screen in the Upper Bakehouse which much improves the area as a venue for meetings and classes.

Hartington Village Hall Lottery: We launched our 2024/25 lottery in August and currently have 115 subscriptions – thank you to each and every one for their support. The twin draws for September and October were made before the start of our Pilates class on Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> October. Our September winner were Janie and David Theaker, Stable Cottage, while our October winner was Eric Brunt, Parsons Close. The first project that is funded from our lottery was completed on 17<sup>th</sup> October with the installation of a range of replacement windows by Matlock Glass. **Hartington Community Group** *High Speed* **Broadband Installation** Funded as part of the government initiative to deliver high speed broadband to homes in rural areas the company Connect Fibre have continued the work required to deliver full fibre high speed broadband connectivity into Hartington and surrounding areas and are now offering residents the opportunity to sign up for their service. Connect Fibre continues to work closely with the Parish Council and Community Group and are planning to hold more information events over the coming months. **Mobile phone 4G service now available** Poor mobile signal availability in and around Hartington has been an issue for a long time, especially the lack of 4G

which has limited the ability to access the internet using phones. But with a recently installed EE mobile phone mast this side of Sheen, it is now possible to get good 4G coverage here if you use EE, or one of the providers that use the EE mobile network. Feedback from those that use the EE network is positive with a good 4G signal around all the village as well as most of the surrounding areas. Good news for those who rely upon their mobile phone for connectivity when out and about.

Our village noticeboards. The noticeboards located around the village have been a tremendous success since they were installed, providing information about the various events that run throughout the year. However, they haven't coped well with the weather throughout the year, suffering some damage. HCG will be looking at options for more enduring replacements during the coming months, any suggestions welcome!

Hartington Wildflower Group Preparing our wildflower areas for the winter months ahead. Work has been taking place across our ten community wildflower areas ahead of the winter



months, getting them ready for next year, but also ensuring that we retain wildlife friendly habitats that will provide much needed shelter over the

coming months. An example seen below is the Youth Hostel pond, with vegetation and hedges trimmed recently. The area remains open all year around though, so why not pop up and admire the lovely view of the village from one the benches there?

**Village Planters** - Thanks to all who have again given their time to water and maintain the planter across the centre of the village. Despite it being the coolest summer since 2015, as well as wet as well again like last year, our planters do need regular

care and attention. As we move into the winter months, there will be some general maintenance & tidying up that will be done, but we will want to leave seed heads etc for the wildlife as much as possible. In addition, the herbs in the planters near to the bus stop will be replenished in the Spring. We have continued to receive positive feedback throughout the year from residents and visitor alike, but any feedback appreciated as always. If you are interested in helping to look after the planters next year, the watering rota starts in May and runs to the end of September, please me know.

Barley straw bales helping manage blanket weed in the Mere You may have noticed bales of straw around the Mere, which have been introduced to help manage the excess of blanket weed we've seen this year. This has had some success, but volunteers will continue to monitor and clear any excess during the winter months.

Developing our village nature trail We have an ambition during 2025 to create a nature trail linking together each of the ten community wildflower areas, providing information to residents and visitors alike about what can be seen locally and how we can all make a difference in protecting our precious environment. The intention is to have several sculptures in place at various points on the trail, created by members of the Hartington sculpture studio and some of the first pieces of work have now been completed, with one shown below. Many thanks to everyone at the Sculpture Studio for their help and support.

Hartington C of E Primary School. Our first week back at school in September was Well Dressing week. This year we had a design that celebrated 200 years of the RNLI. Through collective worship sessions the children learnt about the importance of this organisation and made links to their own experiences of going on holiday to the seaside. All of the children were involved in petalling the well, supported by members of the community.
