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### OUR THREE COMMUNITIES RAISING FUNDS TO HELP OTHERS

As we see daily references to the financial challenges we all face -Biggin, Earl Sterndale and Hartington communities are successfully raising funds to support others. Every edition provides examples of this; here we want to acknowledge not only the individuals who organise and lead on these activities but also say thank you to the many who donate their money and time. So....

**HARTINGTON** -It's 3.30am on the 20<sup>th</sup> March and I am climbing aboard a coach in Buxton, ready to start my trip to Morocco. There are 23 of us who have spent the last year fundraising for Blythe House Hospice. Many in the trip have strong personal reasons for taking part in this, the first of Blythe House's overseas trips, in an attempt to help fund the amazing work that the hospice provides to people with life limiting conditions across the North of Derbyshire.

I have to admit, on that first morning, throughout the long day flying to Marrakesh and the travelling five hours to Ouarzazate by minibus, I was wishing I hadn't signed up, but that feeling soon changed. On the second day we had another long minibus trip into a remote area of Morocco, near the border of Algeria. Here we met our friendly guides, and started our trek, a sun baked four miles. As we climbed the final dune, we could see camp. Cooks had prepared us a delicious meal with "meat and veg". Then we decided to grab a sleeping mat and head onto a flat area of sand to sleep under the stars. I think that night was where friendships really started to form, staring at the star filled sky together, sharing jokes and stories which revealed a little more about who we were and why we were laid in the middle of the Sahara. And then... in the morning, the shared experience of the terrible night's sleep due to the unfamiliar place we were laying, the camels grunting and a couple of members snoring loudly.



Two more full days of walking through remote villages, over high dunes, past human graves where the sand had blown off revealing the remains, eating lunch in the tiny bits of shade we could find, seeing beetles, snake and lizard tracks, all in the scorching heat. One experience I won't forget is getting up to go the toilet in the night to find that my bed had blown over a sand dune and having to find my belongings. A sandstorm was coming, so four of us ended up in a tent meant for two!

On the last day of our trek, we got up early and walked to the top of a dune to watch the sunrise, which was so beautiful. Another 3 miles walk and then, a nine-hour minibus trip back to Marrakesh, where we spent an evening in the city before catching our flight back to Manchester in the morning.

On the trip there were tears, lots of laughter, some sore feet, people struggling with the heat, sad and happy stories, hugs, jokes, card games but most importantly, a group of people who had walked just under 50km and raised an amazing amount of money for such a good cause. Altogether, I raised £4850. Much of this would not have been possible without the amazing community of Hartington who have been so generous, so a huge, huge thank you to everyone. Katherine

### Guest 'letter'

I am guesting the 'letter spot' for this issue and whilst debating with myself what to write about, my family and I went to Ashbourne Elite cinema and saw the 2024 historical dram thriller 'Bonhoeffer'. For those of you not familiar with the name Dietrich Bonhoeffer, he was a German Lutheran pastor and theologian, and anti-Nazi dissident. He was arrested in April 1943 by the Gestapo and imprisoned. He was accused of being associated with the 20 July plot to assassinate Hitler and was tried along with other accused plotters. He was hanged on 9 April 1945 during the collapse of the Nazi regime. He was only 39 when he was killed but his writings and actions have had a profound impact, particularly on the protestant church and German society. He is commemorated in the *Common Worship* (Church of England) calendar on 9<sup>th</sup> April.

The film was a well-made and thought provoking, if not particularly historically accurate, account of Bonhoeffer's life with flashbacks from small boy to his final hours. However, possibly the thing that stayed with me the longest was Pastor Martin Niemöller reading his poem 'First they came' – one of the most famous poems about the Holocaust. (In the film he read the poem from the pulpit in Germany, although actually he wrote it after the war). The poem starkly outlines what happens when 'good' people do not speak up when they see evil.

It made me think and perhaps feel a little guilty about my level of activism! But it is not easy to know what to do is it? There are so many things to worry about – (In no particular order) climate change, aggression by large countries to small, civil wars, national disasters, social injustice ... And then, very few things in life are black and white. In the film we watched Bonhoeffer struggling to balance his pacifist principles with what he saw as an overriding need to rid the world of the evil of the Nazi regime headed by Hitler. In this 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary year of his death, members of Bonhoeffer's extended family and more than 800 Bonhoeffer scholars around the world issued a strong statement condemning the recent co-option of the Bonhoeffer narrative by conservative Evangelical Christians who use it in support President Trump. With them, it is difficult, at least for me, to see how Bonhoeffer's legacy can support actions which he would have deemed unchristian and, in some cases, perhaps even inhumane.

However, do not be too downhearted. We have just celebrated Easter where we remembered the story of Jesus, who gave his life for us, crucified on a cross, to free us from evil. He rose from the dead and, as will celebrate on Ascension Day 29<sup>th</sup> May, went back to God his Father and sent his Holy spirit to help us navigate life and fulfil the new commandment which Jesus gave his disciples on his last meeting with them before his death. 'Love one another as I have loved you'. We can balance any despair we feel at the need for decision, the need for discernment of what is right for each of us and the need to act before it is too late, with the hope that God's goodness will win out in the end.

### As Bonhoeffer wrote

'I believe that God can and will bring good out of evil. For that purpose he needs people who make the best use of everything'. ¹

**Joint Village environment - For peat's sake...!** As we move out of Spring, many of us will head to local garden centres to make sure our gardens look their best for Summer. But too many garden centres still sell compost which contains peat, and potted plants which have been grown in it. The problem is that peat is precious. In their undamaged state, peatlands represent a vast store of carbon laid down in undecayed plant material over at least 10,000 years. In Scotland, peatlands store around 1.6 billion tonnes of carbon – one-third of the carbon held in the Amazon rainforest, despite being 250 times smaller than the Amazon rainforest in area. In England, peatlands store 580 million tonnes of carbon. If you need to buy peat, please consider ditching the peat. If it doesn't say 'peat-free' don't buy it. Even better, make your own compost.

**No Mow May** - Join this growing national campaign to help give wildlife in your gardens a helping hand and 'Say no to the mow' during the month of May. If leaving the whole lawn unmown is too much, consider leaving a smaller area and see what happens! During Spring and Summer, mowing your lawn less and letting parts grow long saves you time and helps give nature a home. If you want to make an even bigger impact on wildlife, wait to mow your lawn or a section of it until August to support even more animals.

Please be aware that a £1,000 can be imposed for dog fouling and that residents can report persistent offenders to Derbyshire Dales District Council.

There will also be ongoing works to restore and reinstate the grass verge resulting from damage caused by vehicles parking on the grass, despite advisory signs in place.

Eco church news - St Giles becomes a net Carbon Zero church. The Church of England has set a goal for all churches to meet this ambitious target by 2030, and St Giles have recently met this target with a combination of using 100% renewable electricity (from an offshore wind farm) and offsetting the CO emissions (which were 2.8 tonnes in 2024, down 15% from 2023) from the oil boiler which remains in occasional use for those really cold days. St Giles will offset the remaining CO emissions via an organisation called climate stewards who support projects in Africa focused on carbon mitigation and sustainability. To help offset those emissions locally, they are looking at the possibility of planting trees in and around the village, so if you have some land that may be suitable, please get in touch.

### St Giles 3Cs Project and Community Survey

### **Toad Patrol**

Our annual Toad Patrol around the village Mere has now completed and again it has been very encouraging to see the numbers of toads, frogs and newts around the Mere and other ponds around the village. Toad and frog spawn has been seen, hopefully to be followed by tadpoles. Especially pleasing again has been the sighting of Great Crested Newts – this country's biggest and rarest newt, protected in law due to significant reduction in numbers over recent years.

The toad warning signs installed around the village Mere have improved awareness of the migrating amphibians, which has reduced the numbers that are sadly killed whilst attempting to cross the roads on their journey to the Mere – thank you to all drivers for slowing down!

Despite the later arrival this year due to the colder weather, mid-March was again the busiest (and noisiest) time in the Mere – with 49 toads and frogs spotted on one evening, an increase from last year, which shows the toad patrol have made a difference. Thanks to all those that have taken part in the patrols.
