What an amazing organisation this is- the support they provide to the volunteers in our 3 Parishes is outstanding. Based at Bakewell Agricultural Centre alongside Social Prescribers and The Farming Life Centre, they are always ready at the end of the phone or email to provide advice and direct or indirect support; if they don't have the answer "they know a man (woman) who does". Many of the good news stories you read about in News and Views have been made possible by this organisation. They work in the largest and most rural district in Derbyshire, an area which is affected by issues such as lack of affordable housing, poor access to services and an ageing population. Much of their work is aimed at tackling these problems. DDCVS provides information, advice, training and support to local groups. They also support individuals who want to develop a new group or organisation.

The 600 copies of this newsletter are printed, every other month, by myself and primarily Shuk – Admin and Facilities manager – at a very reasonable cost. This is just another example of the support they give to us. The key people in each of our communities will know of the work the staff do- however we felt it was important to spread the word amongst the wider community.

The new CEO, in post since Easter, Fay Harris. Her most recent position was as Deputy CEO at Keele University Students' Union, which like DDCVS, is a charity and membership organisation. Fay's previous roles at Keele included Interim CEO, Head of Membership Services and Head of Voice and Advocacy. Fay was also Interim Union Director at Harper Adams University. Fay has completed an MBA; a Postgraduate Certificate in Law; and is a Chartered Manager. She lives in Newcastle-under-Lyme, and her standard 4-day working

pattern is expected to be Monday to Thursday. Some examples of the direct help to our 3 villages is described briefly here-

Biggin – Coffee Cake and Chat is Biggin's social group. It meets on a monthly basis. As well as a chat and the all important cake we



also work with the school and on community activities including the village planters and the parish map.

Everybody is welcome and if you have a community or craft project then we'd love to hear from you. It can be long term or a one off.

The group is a member of the DDCVS and have really appreciated the help and encouragement given to us by Amanda and Polly. As well as advice on putting policies in place, and developing ideas, we have found it useful to network with other groups and services. We are currently in the process of exploring funding applications and exploring how we might grow the group. One of the ways we're doing this is changing the day of the meeting but we're also looking at the kinds of other activities or speakers that we might offer.

Earl Sterndale- We currently have 2 major projects- Grant Application for the Childrens Playing area and application for the Chapel to become a community asset. We are in conversation with the DDCVS who are supporting us with the challenges in completing grant and application forms.

Sterndale Moor- As part of The Parish boundary of Hartington Middle Quarter – Jan, who delivers News and Views in Sterndale Moor, reached out for help to support a project in her community. As always, the DDCVS helped by guiding her towards the High Peak CVS and their support team who are helping Jan in accessing funding

Hartington – the two most recent examples of initiatives that have only been possible with DDCVS support are the refurbishment of our three toilets and the introduction of the sport of 'Pickleball' into our regular activities. The 40 year old Village Hall toilet areas were completely gutted and refurbished through a grant from the 'UK Shared Prosperity Fund: Community Resilience Fund' worth £13,683 in 2024. As you might imagine with such a long-winded title there were a myriad of hoops to jump through but Neil Moulden, then CEO of DDCVS, personally communicated on the grant which was being administered at the local level by the organisation. He understood our preference to use local skilled and trusted individuals to carry out the work and at all times his communications were practical and timely.

The second initiative was to acquire equipment to allow us to introduce the fast growing sport of 'Pickleball' to the community. This time DDCVS guided us to apply to the 'Better Derbyshire Dales Fund' and Sarah again provided timely and wise support in pursuit of us successfully securing a grant of £460. We now have 2-3 regular weekly bookings of the Hall for the sport with players ranging in age from 17-70+.

The importance of volunteers across our three village and beyond cannot be underestimated – their commitment, energy and passion to help each other is reflected in the many items within this newsletter. The support of the DDCVS is critical in ensuring our sustainability THANK YOU.

Patient Participation Group (PPG) Update

The Hartington Surgery Patient Participation Group held its first of two annual meetings on the evening of Thursday 22nd May. A summary of the meeting discussions is available on both the PPG and Surgery Facebook pages, as well as on our website: www.hartingtonsurgery.co.uk.

If you're on Facebook, please consider liking and following the Hartington Surgery page to stay informed about important updates and events.

The Hartington PPG is a patient-led forum that works closely with the practice to share feedback, ideas, and suggestions aimed at improving services. What makes Hartington's PPG unique is that it is a registered charity, raising funds to provide clinical equipment for our patients that may not be readily available via the NHS. Funding is entirely donation-based and can be made by cheque, payable to *Hartington Surgery Patient's Group*.

Over the years, the group has funded and maintained several valuable items such as a self-check blood pressure machine, 24-hour ECG monitors, wheelchairs, a centrifuge, and nebulisers. A full list of equipment purchased is available on request.

The PPG meets twice a year – in May and November – at the Surgery on a Thursday evening at 6.45pm. The group is open to all registered patients of the practice, and we warmly welcome new members.

Citizens Advice Bureau at the Surgery

A Citizens Advice Bureau Outreach Worker is available at the surgery every other Wednesday to support patients with queries regarding Attendance Allowance, Personal Independence Payment (PIP), Disability Living Allowance (DLA), and Universal Credit, and other matters CAB are able to support with.

These appointments must be booked in advance, either through the surgery or via the general CAB appointment line at **o8o8 278 7954**.

Alternatively, you can access drop-in sessions at the Buxton CAB office (Spring Gardens) every Tuesday and Thursday between 10am and 1pm – no appointment needed, first come first served.

Using the NHS App

As part of the NHS's national move towards digital services, we're encouraging all patients to download and use the NHS App. The app allows you to:

- View your medical history and test results
- Request repeat prescriptions
- Book and cancel appointments

Many of our patients already use the app but may not have notifications enabled. Turning on notifications ensures you receive important updates, such as test results, directly to your device. To enable notifications:

- 1. Open the NHS App and log in
- 2. Tap the 'Profile' icon in the top-right corner
- 3. Select 'Notifications'
- 4. Follow the prompt to go to your device settings and enable notifications

Specialist Clinics at Hartington Surgery

We continue to run a number of specialist clinics for patient care, including:

- **Diabetes Clinic:** Monday afternoons
- **Children's Immunisations:** Every other Friday
- Cervical Screening: Every other Friday

Ordering Medication

We kindly ask all patients to order their medication well in advance to ensure timely processing. Our dedicated dispensary team requires three working days to handle requests. Please keep in mind weekends, bank holidays,

and training closures when planning your medication orders to avoid running out. Additionally, if you are planning a holiday, make sure you have enough medication to cover your time away.

Tales from the fields - "Make hay whilst the sun shines!" I love to see the sheep in the fields, I love to see the lambs appear, but I absolutely love what follows the lambs...the fields left to grow into wildflower meadows for just a few weeks before the hay making begins. And how that has changed in the ten years I have lived here. It used to be a slow process with an old tractor, when time allowed and other work commitments slacked off. Now it is like a choreographed dance between three supersized tractors with various efficient looking attachments. The three tractors work together in complete synchronicity, one cutting, one catching and another one emptying to take the place of the trailered catcher, not missing a beat, no stopping, it is a constant tractor dance and its over in a matter of hours. My beautiful meadow view becomes first a perfectly coiffured cut grass maze, endless rows of neatly cut grass, baking in the sunshine with the occasional fluffing (aka tedding/raking) before the most exciting bit...the parcelling up of perfectly symmetrically rolled bales or occasionally old-style rectangular bales which I can remember climbing on as a child. Watching the baling is like tractor poetry to me, if I am lucky enough to be home, you'll see me gleefully position myself overlooking the field, ready to watch the neat rows of fluff be carefully collected in one end and popped out the other neatly wrapped like a Christmas gift in shiny plastic, sometimes this plastic has faces or messages on to further add to the magic of making hay.

To many hay making maybe a mundane chore, or something that happens on the sidelines that requires little acknowledgement or comment. But to me, despite seeing it hundreds of times, it is farming magic, providing food for months after the warm sunshine has said goodbye for the winter and the animals are spending more time inside than out, I hope they feel every drop of sunshine and hard work that created it.

The magic I see is everywhere. The bee with his pollen-coloured flares, the butterfly hovering to decide which beautiful flower on which to rest their weary wings, the joy a grandbaby feels when they pick a flower for closer inspection, but the dance of the humble harvesting tractor will always be a favourite of mine.

Childrens Corner. How to make a sundial (sometimes called a shadow clock)

As the days are getting longer and we have plenty of sunshine why not use an old fashion sundial to tell you



when its bedtime! You'll need- large piece of cardboard (side of a box is fine) Paper plate (or cut a circle from white paper by drawing around a plate) Pencil, Scissors, Pen, 4 stones

Go outside and construct your sundial in a sunny spot as shown in this photo, with the pencil stuck in the middle and the stones used to stop it blowing away.

Ask an adult the time and when it is on the hour, note where the shadow falls and write the time on the clock. Set an alarm for exactly one hour later and add the next time to

the sundial and so on until you have written down a few several times – including your bedtime!

This will not look like a normal clock, the numbers will be in all sorts of strange places, but it will tell you the time and you will be using a type of clock that is 3500 years old!

Derbyshire Dales District Council, Electoral Services. The annual canvass is about to start which is a check on the accuracy and completeness of the electoral register. Residents should expect contact from Derbyshire Dales District Council by letter as the District Council will be sending around 36,000 canvass letters to Derbyshire Dales households. It is anticipated these will start to arrive after 18 July 2025. Please see the full notice on Hartington Parish Council's website.

Potholes The parish council regularly reports issues with road conditions to Derbyshire County Council but the parish council would like to encourage parishioners to also report matters, such as pot holes, pavement issues etc. You may do this by visiting www.derbyshire.gov.uk and following their instructions to report a pothole etc.

3 Joint Village environment section- Assisting local wildlife during very hot weather.

Provide hedgehogs with hedgehog biscuits (available at many pet stores and online) or dog biscuits (small/crumbed) as their prey of slugs, snails and worms diminishes and ensure a safe exit for them and other small mammals if you have a garden pond. Help garden birds by maintaining a filled bird bath and supplying supplementary food including black sunflower seeds, pinhead oatmeal, soaked sultanas, raisins, currants, mealworms, waxworms, and a nutritious seed mixture, when natural supplies become scarce.

This next item was accidentally omitted from the previous edition. Sincere apologies have been given to the family.

Mr George Bailey, brother of William (Bill) Bailey – killed at Dunkirk during WW2 – George died at his home in Luton on 15th March aged 89 years. Primrose (his wife) and George moved to Luton in the 70's. He always loved Hartington and the area and he enjoyed reading "News and Views" He also kept in touch with the Royal British Legion in Hartington and until a few years ago attended the Remembrance Services.

The Royal British Legion was successful in their bid for a Lottery Grant to replace the very old and expensive heating with a newer more economical system. Biggin C of E Primary School It is very strange to realise, as I am writing this piece for News and Views listening to the busy, friendly chatter coming from our Key Stage 1 classroom, that five years ago schools were opening up classrooms to Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 children following the Covid-19 lockdown. I think since then everyone has a much better understanding of the importance of attending

school with peers on children's social development and mental health.

At Biggin, our curriculum is designed to maximise interactions social and widen children's opportunities through including a very wide range of learning in different contexts and especially using the outdoors. Recently we have been especially proud of our developing links with our Forest School practitioner, Beth Riley. These arrangements are so important for wider development and learning what it means to be part of a community.

Affordable Housing The Affordable homes have been on the market for several months at prices between £210,000 and £230,000 which is a 30% discount against an open market value as determined by the District Valuer in accordance with the terms of the legal agreement between Amos Holdings and the Peak Park.

We are informed that to date there have only been 4 general enquiries and one serious enquiry, where the person already has a house to sell. This is particularly disappointing because of course if local people do not express an interest within the next couple of months the Homes will be offered to adjoining parishes and ultimately to anyone living within or on the borders of the Peak Park. We would urge anyone interested who qualifies under local residency/connection or worker terms to contact selling agents as soon as possible.

Neighbourhood Plan The Neighbourhood Plan has completed its Section 16 Public Consultation which was organised and paid for by the Peak Park. An external Examiner will now review these together with the Plan and give his determination as to whether it is fit to proceed to Public Consultation. He will no doubt review matter with the Parish Council ahead of any Decision and we will keep you informed as this proceeds. Hopefully we should proceed to referendum later this year.

The Pond. Following a recent incident, Hartington Town Quarter Parish Council is concerned and requests that no form of wildlife is introduced to the duck pond, including ducklings.

The Well dressing starts Monday 8th **September** in the Village Hall from 10 am to 4pm each day until Friday 12th. Please come and help. On Saturday 13th there will be the Blessing of the School Well at 2.45 and the main well at 3pm by the village pump.

Hartington Village Hall: In 1925 Victor Thomas Perry purchased the land on which the Hall now stands. At the time a stone & tiled stable paint shop, a four bay store shed, a further two bay store shed, and two trap sheds with a joiners' shop over spread around a large yard of some '27 perches'. One of the buildings was converted into a bakehouse in 1926. The upstairs joiners' shop was converted into 'Perry's Room' as a silent picture house. Subsequently in the years 1930-1933 the basic outline of the Main Hall was built and on 5th 1933 Bert Ellis formally opened the 'Amusement Hall'. During 1944 the community raised £1,250 to buy the Amusement Hall and the premises became re-titled as the 'Village Hall'.

To celebrate the centenary of the purchase of land we are holding a series of events between $3^{rd} - 13^{th}$ July. All the events are free to enter and we hope to see many from the community come and enjoy the diverse activities.

Thursday $3^{\rm rd}$ July: Dumfries and Galloway music ensembles

Saturday 5th July: 'Music thro' the Decades' with DJ Rob. There will be a bar and all profits will be donated to our Community First Responders.

Tuesday 8th July: 'Race Night' organised in conjunction with the charity 'Canine Partners'. There will be a bar and all profits from the night will be donated to 'Canine Partners'. 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
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
